1	meeting of the Cook County and Forest Preserve
2	District Annuity and Benefit Fund Board of Trustees
3	for Tuesday, May 18th, Special Board Meeting.
4	Because of the uncertainty surrounding
5	the COVID-19 pandemic, the Board is adhering to the
6	guidance provided most recently by the Governor's
7	April 30, 2021 Disaster Proclamation, the
8	Governor's Executive Order Number 2021-9 as well as
9	the provisions of Public Act 101-0640. There may
10	not be a quorum of trustees physically present at
11	the meeting location. Some trustees, however, are
12	present at the public meeting location as is the
13	Executive Director and Fund counsel. The remaining
14	trustees will participate by videoconference as
15	allowed by the Governor's Executive Order.
16	For the record, the public has received
17	notice of this meeting and of their ability to
18	participate by videoconference or to be physically
19	present at the meeting. In addition, the Fund is
20	recording this meeting and a transcript of the
21	proceedings will, after future approval by the
22	Board, be made available on the Fund's website.
23	Peggy, please call the roll.
24	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair.

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1 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Here. 2 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode. 3 TRUSTEE GOODE: Here. 4 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. TRUSTEE HUGHES: Here. 5 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 6 7 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Here. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. 8 9 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Here. 10 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. 11 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Here. 12 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. 13 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Here. 14 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 15 PRESIDENT WILSON: Here. 16 Thank you. We have a quorum for today's 17 meeting. 18 Consistent with Public Act 91-0715 and reasonable constraints determined by the Board of 19 Trustees, at each meeting of the Board, members of 20 the public may request a brief time to address the 21 22 Board on relevant matters within its jurisdiction. 23 Are there any requests for public comment 24 today? If any member of the public wants to speak,

1 please identify yourself for the record. 2 Fund counsel, I believe that if we have 3 guests shall I ask the guests to identify themselves? 4 5 MS. BURNS: Sir, we can see from the participants, that we have one member of the public 6 7 present, that is Cathryn Marsico from the Bureau of Finance. The other people on the phone are staff 8 9 members or trustees. 10 PRESIDENT WILSON: Thank you, very much. 11 Hearing none, we will proceed with the public business matters. 12 13 Madam Executive Director, Gina, will you 14 take the floor and give us the first matter 15 regarding the legislation? 16 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. Thank you, President 17 Wilson. 18 Just to summarize why we are here today, and the status of events leading to today, last 19 20 week, I believe it was Tuesday or Wednesday 21 evening, I received from John McCabe a copy of the 22 County's proposed legislation, that addresses 23 Article 9 funding along with other matters for 24 Article 9 and a matter for Article 1 relating to

1	Tier 2. It was not received from the County.
2	Subsequent to that, we had some
3	conversations; we being myself, a few staff
4	members, Mary Pat, Trustee Kouruklis and Trustee
5	Ochalla. We had some conversations with John
6	McCabe and Derek Blaida regarding this draft
7	legislation.
8	There is a Senate Pension Committee
9	meeting tomorrow and I believe there is a House
10	Pension Committee meeting on Thursday.
11	As we get towards the end of the session,
12	the speed at which bills can move is a little bit
13	different than the beginning of the session.
14	So, with that in mind, we wanted to make
15	sure that we reviewed this legislation and had a
16	discussion with the Board on proceeding forward.
17	I would like to add that the CFL has also
18	been in some discussions with some of you,
19	including Trustee Kouruklis regarding the proposed
20	legislation.
21	You may recall that last week I sent
22	around a letter that we were going to send to
23	Senator Martwick about our bill and the dedication
24	of this Board to obtaining actuarially based

1 funding for the Article 9 and 10 funds. 2 The CFL representatives Andrea Kluger and 3 Rob Reiter were included on that email that was sent to Senator Martwick with that letter. 4 5 I do think it's important to mention that in discussions with John McCabe, and he is 6 7 available for us to bring into this meeting later, our bill, our actuarial funding bill, that the 8 9 Board approved in March, was given to Senator 10 Martwick but has not been introduced into the 11 Senate at this time. 12 I also want to point out that the 13 County's bill did come out of LRB and I got that 14 late yesterday and a copy of that is included. 15 I had sent you all the proposed County language last week when I received it but now it 16 17 has actually come out of LRB and you have that copy 18 in front of you. With that in mind, staff met with Mary 19 20 Pat and we put together a list of -- it is kind of similar format to two years ago but of course the 21 contents are a little bit different. We put 22 23 together some highlights of this legislation, along 24 with concerns or comments. We also have a separate

1	document, I don't want to make things too
2	confusing, but we also have a separate document
3	that just kind of highlights the County's proposed
4	legislation; so pieces of it, along with our
5	proposed legislation. So that is kind of a status
6	of where we are to-date.
7	PRESIDENT WILSON: What would members of
8	the Special Committee and the Legislative
9	Committee, what is your pleasure today?
10	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I think I'd like to
11	go over the points that the Fund and counsel,
12	including other members of the Fund, helped put
13	together.
14	I think it's important to point out the
15	comparison between our draft legislative intent in
16	our bill that was not introduced and the bill that
17	was recently introduced through the LRB system from
18	the County. Can we go through those points?
19	MS. TUCZAK: Yes. I guess we will start
20	out with the legislative comparison, which is a
21	one-page document two-sided, just to kind of
22	highlight what is in the County's bill.
23	So, the first is that there is minimum
24	required contributions from the employer beginning

1	January 1, 2022 and that would be calculated by the
2	Fund's actuary. It would be submitted, the request
3	would be submitted, by June 14th of every year. It
4	would achieve 100 percent funding by 2046, that
5	includes what we call a 30-year layered
6	amortization schedule of the unfunded liability.
7	It does provide for a 2 percent increase
8	over time. It is modeled very similar to the IGA
9	that was put in place in 2016.
10	There is no funding in this particular
11	piece of the bill for the health plan so this would
12	only be focused on pension liabilities.
13	The target year is 2046 for pension.
14	Again, there is no target year for health. There
15	is no
16	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I'm sorry. Instead
17	of running through all of them, can we just focus
18	on the point by point?
19	MS. TUCZAK: Sure.
20	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So the comparison to
21	our legislation since we approved that is what? We
22	had it to 90 percent funded, correct?
23	MS. TUCZAK: We had 90 percent funded
24	over 40 years.

1 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: And the healthcare 2 portion? 3 MS. TUCZAK: The healthcare was included in the actuarial calculations. So our legislation 4 5 took the health and pension liabilities combined and provided for actuarial funding of those two 6 7 liabilities over a 40-year period to get us to 90 percent of both obligations. 8 9 MS. BURNS: In doing that, we mirrored 10 what other public pension funds in the State of 11 Illinois have in place. 12 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 13 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: When you say we 14 mirrored, we mirrored the 90 percent? 15 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 16 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: And we also mirrored 17 the healthcare portion or is that different? 18 MS. BURNS: That is different in that other public pension funds don't have a healthcare 19 20 program such as that operated by this Fund. The other City pension funds pay a subsidy for 21 healthcare. It is a lot lower than what your fund 22 23 pays. It is either \$25 or \$65 per person, 24 depending on whether people are Medicare or

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1	non-Medicare.
2	Other public pension funds in the state
3	include that subsidy for healthcare into the amount
4	that is amortized to get to 90 percent funded in 40
5	years.
6	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Which we did as well?
7	MS. BURNS: Yes, since your healthcare
8	costs are a lot bigger.
9	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Why is that?
10	MS. TUCZAK: Our Fund right now is
11	administering a health program and we're
12	self-insured. We are not like some of the City
13	Fund's just providing a subsidy and that is the end
14	of the game. We have the whole administration of
15	the program. In terms of selecting the medical
16	benefits, the pharmacy benefits, et cetera.
17	MS. BURNS: You remember, historically,
18	we have talked about how that came about. That
19	Section 239 of the Code, talks about group health
20	benefits. And, it states in that section, that
21	this Fund, you, as the Board, can determine to
22	subsidize any percentage from 0 to 100 percent of
23	your annuitant's healthcare program administered by
24	the County. But at some point in time, 1981, 19

1	MR. LEDONNE: '90, '91.
2	MS. TUCZAK: About 30 years.
3	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: When Phelan commenced
4	and Woody Bowman was on the scene.
5	MS. BURNS: I thought that was earlier.
6	When they came on, then you took on not only a
7	percentage subsidy but the actual administration of
8	the healthcare fund, which is different than every
9	other pension fund in the City, really in the
10	state.
11	TRUSTEE GOODE: I have a question about
12	how, and maybe it is not listed in her proposal,
13	but how do they propose to break that out; the
14	health portion. It is being said that this is only
15	about the pension benefits, but if you're giving us
16	the money as you always have how do they propose to
17	say, hey, this is only used for this?
18	MS. TUCZAK: What they have in this
19	legislation is they would provide the County
20	would provide to the Fund \$50 million in 2022 to be
21	paid in two installments and that would be used to
22	fund healthcare in 2022.
23	Subsequent to 2022, the amount that they
24	would pay would be subject to an intergovernment

1 agreement between the County and the Fund and that 2 amount could be increased no more than CPIU or 4 3 percent, whichever is lower, and that would be an 4 annual agreement. 5 TRUSTEE GOODE: Maybe I think a little bit too much. 6 7 MS. TUCZAK: It is complicated. There is 8 a lot to think about. 9 TRUSTEE GOODE: Is that going to 10 negatively affect how staff is dealing with health 11 matters? 12 MS. TUCZAK: Yes, that presents many 13 administrative challenges, which we do have kind of 14 a table of all of these issues. To summarize some 15 of these -- would you like me to talk about that 16 now? 17 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Please. 18 MS. TUCZAK: Okay. We have a couple of problems. One is that we have increasing 19 retirements at a pace faster than inflation is 20 21 increasing. 22 In addition, if we are limited to two 23 payments, there is no guarantee that health claim 24 submission is going to be consistent throughout the

1 year. We have spikes. We pay our medical claims 2 on a weekly basis. We pay our pharmacy claims 3 twice a month. There is no guarantee that that is 4 going to be a consistent number every week or every 5 two weeks. So to get two payments can cause a cash flow problem for us. 6 7 This legislation stipulates that beginning January 1st of 2022 no assets of the Fund 8 9 can be used to subsidize health benefits, other 10 than those two injections of cash. 11 So, for example, the first payment that they are going to make is January 15th of 2022. I 12 13 can just tell you that we already have payments to 14 United Healthcare going out the first and second 15 week of January. 16 If we don't have enough cash from the 17 member contributions that they pay for healthcare 18 to cover those, what are we supposed to do just not pay the claims? Just tell UHC, we will get back to 19 20 you later? So that creates an administrative 21 issue. 22 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: On that point, when 23 we presented this same issue last year or two years 24 ago I should say, in 2019, what was the County's

1 response with our problem that we currently have 2 that you just stated, that we would not be able to 3 keep up with the payments of healthcare? In 4 addition, I am assuming that there is no way of 5 diminishing any of these services to healthcare. MS. TUCZAK: That had to be a 6 7 consideration, if there wants to be a diminishment 8 of benefits. 9 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Is that the goal? 10 Have you been told that that is the goal to 11 diminish services related to healthcare to 12 retirees? 13 MS. TUCZAK: I have not been told that. 14 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: To continue though 15 providing the service that we have, and with the 16 limited amount of funds in the timing of the 17 payments or the lack of the timing of payments, 18 have we expressed as a group to the County our concerns and what was their response? 19 20 MS. TUCZAK: Two years ago the setup of 21 this health program that they proposed was different. Because in addition to an infusion of 22 23 cash, they had stabilization reserve that could be 24 utilized. This legislation doesn't provide for

1 that stabilization. 2 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So it is worse for us 3 at this point? MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 4 5 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Okay. All right, go ahead. 6 7 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Can I ask one question 8 before you go on, Gina. 9 MS. TUCZAK: Sure. 10 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: They said CPIU, that is 11 universal CPI rate? MS. TUCZAK: For urban consumers. 12 13 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: What is that ratio in 14 regards to how healthcare costs have increased? We 15 just went through the whole health benefits. Isn't there a CPI health as well --16 17 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 18 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: -- that is significantly higher? 19 20 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. The CPI for medical 21 generally speaking is higher than CPIU. Several 22 percentage points difference. I mean, it is never 23 a guarantee in the future. CPI medical has been trending higher than just a straight out CPIU so 24

1 that is another issue. 2 MS. BURNS: And, again, that issue was 3 brought up two years ago. TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I remember that. 4 5 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 6 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: I have a guestion or 7 In terms of funding the healthcare, as comment. this Board and the staff is well aware, we have two 8 9 funds within our Fund; the Forest Preserve Fund and 10 the County Fund. In terms of healthcare, both 11 funds are included, is that correct, are covered? 12 MS. TUCZAK: In terms of our 13 administration, yes, both the Forest Preserve and 14 the County people are included in the health plan 15 that we administer. 16 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: And in terms of this 17 analysis that was done by the staff, it is very 18 clear, and in reading the legislation it was very clear, that the Forest Preserve Fund was not 19 included, was not considered, in terms of this 20 legislation. So it makes it very difficult for us 21 to do much with the legislation, if Article 10 is 22 23 not included in it. And I just suggest that in 24 every point that we consider, and I think it was

1 done by staff, too, that both funds be considered 2 on these points of the legislation that they are 3 proposing, that is my comment. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Good point, Trustee 4 5 Nevius. TRUSTEE HUGHES: Just to followup on 6 7 Trustee Nevius' point, I know the County had proposed merging the funds, the two funds. Was 8 9 that proposed in the most recent legislation? 10 MS. TUCZAK: That was not proposed. 11 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Interesting. Okay, thank you. 12 13 MS. TUCZAK: I will continue with the 14 general description of this bill, if that is okay. 15 We talked a little bit about the health 16 benefits. There is a couple of other things in 17 there. Board makeup. This legislation provides 18 that the Board President can have two appointed Trustees that would be added to the Board so that 19 would be a Board of 11. And in addition to what we 20 21 have now two presidential appointments. 22 There is no specification that those two 23 appointees be members of the Fund. It talks about 24 qualifications that they are supposed to have, but

1	there is no mechanism to verify those
2	qualifications.
3	It does provide in terms of a funding
4	source, it provides that the funding for the
5	contributions can come from any source, not just
6	the real estate tax levy.
7	There is also a Tier 2 element to this
8	legislation and the word that they use is that the
9	salary levels and earnings considered for the
10	pension, which this is their word, "track" the
11	Social Security base.
12	It mentions that this would go back to
13	2011, but it also specifically says that there is
14	no ability to go back and recover contributions for
15	those people that have had salaries that would be
16	impacted by this change.
17	So that is a summary but certainly we can
18	spend more time going through the points.
19	There is one other matter, I apologize,
20	is that there is a military service element that
21	was added into this that basically allows anybody
22	that started prior to 1-1-1993, regardless of years
23	of service, can purchase up to two years of
24	military service credit.

1	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Can you go back to the
2	Tier 2 issue and kind of flush out for me the
3	recovery that you are talking about? Are we
4	talking about people that have put in under Tier 2
5	not receiving contributions back if they retire
6	with excess amount?
7	MS. BURNS: No, it is the opposite. What
8	it looks like is that Tier 2 benefits would be
9	recalculated and the Fund would never get the
10	contributions that are due for those benefits.
11	But, go ahead, Gina, you can explain it.
12	MR. LEDONNE: Just to give you a high
13	level example or the current year example,
14	currently the Tier 2 cap for salary is roughly
15	\$116,000. I believe the Social Security cap is
16	\$130,000. Does that sound right? High hundred and
17	twenties. Whatever it is, a Tier 2 employee could
18	retire in the next couple of years, and my
19	interpretation of the legislation or our
20	interpretation of this legislation is that if that
21	person was making \$140,000, we now need to use
22	\$130,000 for calculation purposes, despite the fact
23	that they only contributed on \$116,000.
24	So that is inconsistent kind of with

1 other parts of the statute where your benefit is 2 based on the amount you contributed to that salary. 3 That makes a lot of inconsistencies throughout our 4 system the way everything is designed and the way 5 everything has always worked. I don't know other than that. 6 7 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: How difficult do you think that would be to administer? 8 9 MS. TUCZAK: We have to do some 10 programing designing to our system. The other 11 issue is that this goes retroactive to 1-1-2011 and we have had members applying for benefits in the 12 13 last decade that are Tier 2 employees. Whether it 14 is disability or survivors, so all those would have 15 to be recalculated and additional benefits paid on 16 which we would receive no contributions. 17 MS. BURNS: And we don't know how it will 18 impact reciprocal systems. We would have to look all that up. 19 20 Even though it is put in Article 1 of the Pension Code, it really only refers to Article 9, 21 which I don't really get. That doesn't make any 22 23 sense because Article 1, as you know, is an article 24 of general applicability to all pension funds. Yet

1	this one only applies to Article 9 as opposed to
2	any other system. So it leaves the Tier 2 problem
3	out there for everybody else, which makes no sense.
4	MS. TUCZAK: That is a summary from the
5	two-sided document. There is another document that
6	I think is five pages long that certainly goes into
7	more rigor on the concerns and related comments.
8	I am happy to discuss in more detail, if
9	you would like, or we can kind of discuss an action
10	plan. There are quite a few concerns and comments
11	about this bill.
12	PRESIDENT WILSON: What is the pleasure
13	of the group? Is there a motion? Do you want to
14	have more conversation?
15	TRUSTEE BLAIR: I think there is
16	significant issue with Article 10 not even being
17	mentioned in here to Trustee Nevius' point, which
18	we still have to concern ourselves with.
19	To Gina's point about two payments with
20	regards to the health benefit and us having a
21	shortfall as we make our payments to the health
22	system, these are significant issues that will
23	cause administrative issues and other issues along
24	the way. Those issues weren't taken into account

1	by the County as their legislation was written.
2	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I also have had
3	discussions with CFL, who has had discussions with
4	their affiliates, and they are opposed to this as
5	written.
6	They are not really understanding the
7	issues that we discussed about the medical trust
8	issue and also the Tier 2 administration and how
9	that would affect their members and how it would
10	affect our administration of that.
11	You know, there also seems to be a sense
12	that, specifically on the funding, obviously, they
13	are in favor of the ARC funding getting us to
14	actuarial funding.
15	There also seems to be a consensus that
16	maybe it should be broken up. Discuss the issues
17	independently on that. It doesn't necessarily need
18	to be done this session but have further discussion
19	over the summer.
20	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I'm sorry, break up
21	the two separate discussions on
22	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Instead of doing one
23	massive bill that discusses all these different
24	issues of addressing funding, addressing the

1	medical, taking more time to work those out
2	necessarily so that they are effective.
3	There is still a lot of questions on
4	their end about how these would apply and obviously
5	they have a lot of the same questions that we are
6	having about this and the same position that this
7	Board has been in regards to governance, our
8	position against that change. Our position for ARC
9	funding for multitude or any source of funding for
10	Forest Preserve Fund, you know, getting those
11	things through. They are pretty much instep with
12	us and our positions on this.
13	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: With that being said,
14	I would like a motion. Before I do the motion, I

1	those points that we agreed on prior to this
2	meeting covered in our bill?
3	MS. TUCZAK: So our bill was solely
4	focused on securing actuarial funding for Article 9
5	and Article 10, that is what our bill covered. We
6	did not address any other issues in there.
7	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: But we did address
8	healthcare because the funding was part of
9	healthcare. We addressed the target year. We had
10	our target year and we agreed to a 90 percent
11	funding because that is the standard in the state
12	and we thought that would be important. And I
13	think it was brought up a couple of years ago that
14	we were overly aggressive in our actuarial
15	assumptions on coming up with an aggressive funding
16	bill in 2019.
17	We have addressed the unfunded liability,
18	the target year, County contributions, healthcare,
19	Tier 2 we did not.
20	MS. TUCZAK: We did not.
21	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: We did not bring up
22	Tier 2 because we are really looking for the state
23	to help guide us in whatever the Tier 2 agreement
24	amongst I guess most of, if not all of the pension

1	funds, we would adhere to, based on not having
2	we realized we could be the first to introduce
3	legislation requiring additional Tier 2 changes.
4	Could we come up with Tier 2 language
5	that could help our bill pass and introduce that
6	bill and agree with Labor that that is something
7	that we could push since we're in agreement with
8	our funding bill and far away on what the County
9	has proposed?
10	MS. TUCZAK: It is always possible to
11	come up with additional language and legislation,
12	but it is going to take time. The Tier 2 is a
13	complex issue that impacts as I said on that
14	call with Senator Martwick, it impacts all the
15	funds in the state. So, I guess, I would look to
16	Mary Pat on that but I would think anything is
17	possible but it takes time.
18	MS. BURNS: Right. What I would just
19	suggest, Trustee Kouruklis, is that we assist the
20	CFL with language that they would want to introduce
21	on behalf of their members because you, as
22	trustees, are really just focused on funding. You
23	don't get into the benefits as fiduciaries.
24	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Thank you. I'd like

1 to propose that we introduce our bill again to 2 Springfield, have John McCabe bring that as our agreed bill, that we would like to move forward on. 3 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I thought that we did 4 5 that. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: But officially I 6 7 wanted to do that again. MS. BURNS: I don't think he introduced 8 9 it. 10 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: He did not introduce 11 it, no. 12 MS. BURNS: He has not introduced our 13 bill. I think you ask him to explain that process when he is on the phone. 14 15 MS. TUCZAK: I can get him on whenever 16 you want. 17 MS. BURNS: When you are ready, but, go 18 ahead, Trustee Kouruklis. 19 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I don't want to waste 20 time trying to figure out how to fix a bill that 21 was not brought to us ahead of time. We did not 22 work on that bill. There was no discussion over 23 the past two years on those points that they provided to us over the last two weeks or week or 24

1 whatever it has been. But we have had a lot of 2 discussion on our bill and a lot of expertise has 3 been applied to that bill. I'd like to, again, motion that we 4 5 introduce our bill and also look forward to working with the Chicago Federation of Labor and the other 6 7 labor members that are affiliated with CFL on having them work on Tier 2. 8 9 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I would second that. 10 TRUSTEE BLAIR: The bill as we have it, 11 our bill, addresses our core issue. That is our focus, right, actuarial funding for the Fund? 12 13 PRESIDENT WILSON: Let me just jump in. 14 So it has been moved by Trustee Kouruklis and 15 seconded by Trustee Ochalla. We are now ready for 16 discussion. 17 Go ahead, Trustee Blair. 18 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Thank you. Our bill goes 19 at what our core responsibility is in providing for 20 the Fund, right? And we have all these other 21 ancillary issues that the County has introduced in 22 their bill. I just don't understand what the 23 County is -- I guess I can see it but I don't 24 understand where they are going with it.

1 The direction that we have is clear and 2 it is actuarial funding and that should be 3 paramount to what our focus should be. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: 4 The County's particulars haven't been talked back and forth to 5 come to some kind of a compromise. 6 7 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Operationally, 8 administratively, it seems like there is too many 9 issues that they have introduced because they don't 10 understand maybe what our goal is. 11 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I hope they don't 12 think that we were in a position where we were 13 nonresponsive because that would really be --14 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I think it is safe to 15 say that information from our Board has flowed very 16 consistently to the County. 17 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I think you're 100 18 percent right. I think we have to -- at the opening paragraph of any correspondence, I think we 19 have to maintain that thought so that we don't seem 20 21 like we have been nonresponsive because I think 22 that is the way it will be sold. 23 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Agreed. 24 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: A little more

1 discussion on that, I just wanted to make sure 2 because I didn't touch on this point, our 3 legislation also allows for other types of funding, not just property tax; is that correct? 4 5 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: For the Forest Preserve. 6 7 MS. TUCZAK: For the Forest Preserve. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: For both. 8 9 MS. TUCZAK: That is a very good point, 10 Trustee Ochalla. I will call it the shell bill, 11 that was introduced earlier in the session, provided that any source of funding for the Forest 12 13 Preserve Article 10 could be used to contribute to 14 the Fund, that was an Article 10 bill. 15 But I believe that -- I would have to 16 double check, maybe Gary knows, when we did the 17 March bill, if that language was added for Article 18 9. Let me check, if you don't mind. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: If it is not, I 19 20 wanted to add it. 21 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: It's been there from Day 1. 22 23 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I thought so. 24 MS. BURNS: The bill that you approved,

1 that LRB then put together, that has not yet been 2 introduced. The language provides the County may 3 continue to use other lawfully available Funds in lieu of all or part of the tax levy. So, for 4 5 either 9 or 10 Article, you can use any money which would not require an increase in property tax. 6 7 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: That was my next 8 question. 9 MS. BURNS: It could but they don't have 10 to. 11 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Right. So, that was 12 my next question. We are not advocating a property 13 tax increase because we are allowing for other 14 funds as the IGA does today. 15 MS. BURNS: Yes, that was the thinking 16 you had originally. 17 TRUSTEE GOODE: I agree with the 18 reintroduction of our bill. I am concerned that it hasn't been submitted. But I also would like us to 19 20 be very, very vocal about why the County's bill is not conducive to our needs and how it would affect 21 22 the way we administer the pension benefits. 23 People want to question our resolve and 24 the way we do things but they didn't come to us and

1	discuss this. It is a real concern to me. You
2	know, there is all this conversation about working
3	together but where is it? So that is my comments
4	about our bill.
5	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The other concern
6	that you bring up, Trustee Goode, is that it is
7	ironic that now they want to introduce more I
8	should say more appointees to this Board, when we
9	are having a product in front of us that none of us
10	can agree on and how far away we are on some of
11	this language that is in their bill.
12	So, you are right, if they were to work
13	together with us, we probably could get somewhere
14	on most of these items. Or, maybe, if they would
15	have read our initial legislation that we proposed
16	that we sent to them.
17	MS. TUCZAK: We did send that to them.
18	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I know and we have
19	multiple letters addressing what our next steps are
20	going to be and we recap in our letters to the
21	Board, to the County, and I believe to the Board of
22	Commissioners we have copied on some of these
23	letters.
24	MS. TUCZAK: Yes.

1 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So I don't want to 2 waste too much of everybody's time. I know we 3 called this Special Board Meeting but we work hard on our legislation. The motion is on the table. 4 5 I'm sorry, Trustee McFadden. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I wanted some time. 6 7 So, the conversation is whether or not we officially introduce this, is that what we are 8 9 doing? 10 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Yes. We are 11 officially introducing -- the motion is to 12 officially introduce our legislation. Have points, 13 to Trustee Goode's point, that we identify all the 14 issues that we currently have with the County's 15 legislation as part of our introduction. It would 16 be a cover letter and we also in that cover letter 17 identify that we are willing to work with Labor on 18 maybe a different bill on Tier 2. 19 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I'm sorry. The legislation that we thought had been introduced is 20 21 secondary to a really beautiful letter addressing 22 what the particulars and the overall issue that the 23 two bills are at odds I think. But we're not going 24 to attach a cover letter to the bill and send it

1	across the street, are we? Do we want to do that?
2	I think it would be cleaner to leave the two things
3	apart and stick with the bill that we have been
4	sending down through the years and stand by it.
5	But then as an aside, we have to have an
6	intelligent document, letter type thing. That lays
7	it out.
8	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Does it have to go
9	hand-in-hand with the bill that is introduced?
10	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I guess it doesn't
11	but I think because of the timing and because
12	Senator Martwick has been gracious enough to
13	include us in a conversation with the County, I
14	thought that was really important that we had that
15	discussion. And I wanted to make sure that he and
16	his staff had an understanding of this is not just
17	the County saying here's our bill, period. I
18	thought they should go together. We have obvious
19	unanimous issues, if that is the case, with the
20	current bill that has been introduced by the County
21	and our bill addresses most, if not all, of those
22	issues. And what it doesn't address, which is the
23	Tier 2, we are happy to work with Labor on a future
24	bill.

1	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I think that our staff
2	here at the Fund has worked incredibly hard to not
3	only in our bill address serious particular
4	problems that we want to have fixed with how this
5	fund receives the two funds receive income and
6	sources, but has also done in response numerous
7	times to the County's legislation has done
8	actuarial research, healthcare research, and put
9	together clear, articulable reasons as to why some
10	of the concerns that we raise about the County's
11	legislation are just that. Are serious concerns
12	that would seriously hinder the administration of
13	benefits for this fund. And they have been thought
14	out and well-articulated to them and we have not
15	received response from the County addressing those
16	issues or those concerns.
17	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: A bill I am just
18	thinking that if the bill hasn't been formally
19	introduced, then I don't think we can formally
20	introduce it with a cover letter to Senator
21	Martwick, can we?
22	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I don't care how it
23	gets introduced. I just want to make sure he sees
24	our points. Separately is fine.

1 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Okay. 2 TRUSTEE GOODE: Right. 3 TRUSTEE BLAIR: He understands that 4 there's been some thought put into this. He 5 digested what the County is introducing in comparison to what our bill is. 6 7 MS. BURNS: Because of the timing, 8 perhaps when you are ready to get Mr. McCabe on the 9 phone, tell him it is your direction to get this 10 bill introduced, the Cook County Pension Fund's 11 funding bill. 12 He may tell you he hasn't been able to 13 get sponsors for that bill, that is what he might 14 tell you. 15 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: After all this time? 16 MS. BURNS: Yes. He may also tell you it is too late in the game. 17 18 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Sorry to interrupt. We have Senator Martwick that we can urge to 19 20 sponsor it. 21 MS. BURNS: That is my point. First, you 22 ask Mr. McCabe if he can get the bill introduced. 23 We don't know the answer to that. We thought it 24 was introduced, right?

1	TRUSTEE BLAIR: That was the direction
2	for McCabe.
3	MS. TUCZAK: That was the direction.
4	MS. BURNS: We just found this out the
5	other day and we confirmed that the proposed bill
6	had not been introduced. Mr. McCabe can maybe
7	explain why it was not introduced. So, that is the
8	Fund's bill. If he can't introduce it, then
9	absolutely it should go to Senator Martwick, with
10	an explanation why we as Pension Fund Trustees,
11	subject to fiduciary duties, that funding is what
12	you are seeking. That has always been my position
13	since 2012.
14	The other important thing here is we
15	believe, we might be wrong, that a second hearing
16	on this County proposed bill could be heard as
17	early as tomorrow.
18	It seems to us that we need to give us
19	direction on how we get to the maybe it is
20	asking Mr. McCabe and Blaida to ask Senator
21	Martwick to defer consideration of the County's
22	bill until such time as we can sit with the County
23	to express your concerns? Is it to just give a
24	

1 aggressive than that? How are we to convey your concerns to these people in a very short period of 2 3 time? Because as we understand it, they could have a hearing tomorrow; the proposed legislation could 4 5 go to the floor. Or, a hearing at the House on Thursday, right? 6 7 MS. TUCZAK: The House has a Pension Committee meeting. 8 9 MS. BURNS: There is a Pension meeting on Wednesday at the Senate, Thursday in the House, it 10 11 could hit the floor and be voted on before we ever 12 get our letter to them, that is why we need your 13 direction. 14 Are you comfortable to get Mr. McCabe on 15 the phone and telling him to deliver that message? 16 Do you want us to deliver the message? How do you 17 want this conveyed? 18 MS. TUCZAK: Can I just add one thing, Mary Pat, if you don't mind? 19 MS. BURNS: Of course. 20 21 MS. TUCZAK: I just want to remind 22 everybody that on Friday, last Friday, I sent 23 Senator Martwick a letter that articulated our 24 focus on actuarial funding and I attached our

1	actual bill that came out of LRB so he has that
2	from us so we did that on Friday just as a
3	reminder.
4	MS. BURNS: Maybe then the direction
5	would be to just do a separate letter to Senator
6	Martwick referencing Friday's correspondence and
7	saying all the concerns you have articulated with
8	respect to the County's bill. Because in our
9	conversation with Senator Martwick, he ended the
10	call saying, "Well, it looks like we're pretty
11	close; there is a lot of agreement here" and that's
12	not the case because we haven't seen the language
13	and there is obviously a lot of problems with it.
14	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Isn't there a way of
15	requesting that we amend the current bill that is
16	there with our language?
17	MS. BURNS: I don't think so. I am not
18	sure I understand what you mean. You mean the
19	County's bill?
20	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Correct. That's a
21	bill that already has does it have a bill
22	number?
23	MS. BURNS: Yes.
24	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: It has a bill number

1	and right now it is sitting there possibly to be
2	introduced during Wednesday's meeting as passage or
3	some sort of compromise to that bill. I am saying
4	as a compromise, since we studied their bill and
5	you identified the points that we have a problem
6	with, could we introduce our bill as an amendment?
7	MS. BURNS: I don't think you'd get the
8	language drafted by tomorrow that you would all
9	agree to or that would give you comfort that it
10	works, agreed?
11	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: It would strike out
12	theirs and we would add ours.
13	MS. BURNS: You would strike the whole
14	thing and revise it?
15	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: It is a funding bill.
16	It is not like we are introducing a different bill.
17	MS. TUCZAK: I think John McCabe would be
18	better to address those questions, that's not
19	something that I would know the answer to.
20	PRESIDENT WILSON: Let's get him on the
21	phone. Are we ready for him, counsel?
22	MS. BURNS: Yes. I don't know if it is
23	him or Mr. Blaida.
24	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: We should have both.

1	If Mr. McCabe didn't have any luck, maybe we should
2	have Derek Blaida introduce the language. We're
3	trying a second time, I mean nothing personal
4	against Mr. McCabe. I am saying we have an urgent
5	matter here.
6	MS. TUCZAK: John McCabe said he could
7	enter into our Teams meeting. Derek I need to call
8	on the phone there. I am going to get Derek on the
9	call.
10	John and Derek, we have been discussing
11	the County's proposed legislation for the past hour
12	or so and the Board has made a motion, which I
13	believe the roll call was the roll call done
14	yet?
15	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: It is not done yet.
16	MS. TUCZAK: We have some questions for
17	you. John, if you could first address with the
18	Board the submission of the legislation that we
19	provided to you in March, where that stands?
20	MR. MCCABE: So legislation was given to
21	me well after the deadline for introduction of the
22	bills. So, what has often happened, you introduce
23	another bill, and then you put the real legislation
24	on later. So I drafted what I was given a month

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1	after the deadline, the language, and that was
2	early March. March 5th I believe. I submitted it
3	to the Reference Bureau. They gave me a version to
4	the House and the Senate. I gave it to the House
5	or the Senate sponsor. The House sponsor had a
6	local election and I didn't give it to her because
7	she was in the middle of that and I didn't want our
8	language to ever come up as an issue in that
9	election and I was going to wait until after.
10	That bill was moved out of the House,
11	passed out of the House, and got over to Senate.
12	And I asked I had given the language to Senator
13	Martwick and he gave it to his staff to hang onto
14	and so he never introduced it. There was no
15	ability to introduce it as a new and separate bill
16	after the deadline. So, for both submitting to the
17	Reference Bureau as a new bill or for introduction
18	so both of those deadlines.
19	So, Senator Martwick has the language. I
20	think he was going to use it at one point as is
21	part of negotiations and discussions and go from
22	there.
23	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: It's clear that we
24	could have introduced it but I think what our

1	lobbyist John McCabe is saying is he didn't because
2	there was some issue in the House with somebody
3	during the election. Didn't want to interfere. I
4	don't know how that impacts us and why that
5	decision was even made. I wasn't consulted. I
6	don't know if anybody else was but that is a
7	problem for us as a Fund. But going forward, what
8	we're asking is introducing our bill as an
9	amendment. Is that possible?
10	MR. MCCABE: So what we have in the
11	Senate is that the Chairman of the Committee where
12	any member would go is Senator Martwick and he has
13	the bills. And, so, we could ask someone else to
14	file an amendment that, you know, based on
15	deadlines is not going to happen between now and
16	the end of May, you know, getting out of Senate
17	assignments, assigned to a Committee, adopted and
18	round up the votes to pass.
19	MR. LEDONNE: What about just introduced?
20	MR. MCCABE: I'm sorry.
21	MR. LEDONNE: How about just being
22	introduced, though?
23	MR. MCCABE: As a new bill?
24	MR. LEDONNE: As an amendment.

1 MR. MCCABE: Well, I can have someone 2 else introduce an amendment to Senator Martwick's 3 bills or try to find another vehicle. It still has to go through his committee. 4 5 TRUSTEE GOODE: It still has to go 6 through what? 7 MR. LEDONNE: Through his committee. MS. TUCZAK: Through Senator Marwick's 8 9 committee. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Let me ask Mr. 10 11 Blaida. Mr. Blaida, are you on? 12 MR. BLAIDA: Yes. But I can barely hear 13 you, if you could come a little bit closer, that 14 would be great. 15 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Mr. Blaida, my 16 question is, it is Trustee Kouruklis, is there 17 anything that you can think of that since we missed 18 our opportunity initially in the House and now according to Mr. McCabe it was held in the Senate, 19 20 is there any way for us to introduce our bill, the 21 legislation that we have come up with back in 22 March, as an amendment to the current bill that the 23 County has introduced which is Senate Bill 2094? 24 If not, is there any other way of introducing our

1	bill at this point?
2	MR. BLAIDA: A couple of issues that I
3	would like to make. One, the County cannot file an
4	amendment to Senate Bill 2094 today for two
5	reasons.
6	One, because that bill, the underlying
7	bill was sent to the Senate Assignments Committee.
8	It would be ruled out of order. The sponsor's
9	amendment would be ruled out of order and prevented
10	from filing an amendment on any bill that currently
11	sits in the Senate Assignments Committee according
12	to Senate rules, that is number one.
13	Number two, whatever bill they end up
14	filing an amendment on, Mr. McCabe is absolutely
15	right, it would be in Senator Martwick's committee
16	and I am assuming it would be viewed as a quote
17	unquote hostile amendment.
18	We can file a clean bill. But,
19	obviously, because of the status procedurally, that
20	would not be able to be heard for no other reason
21	than you are rushing out of additional days to get
22	a clean bill through the entire process by May
23	31st.
24	Because of the timelines, because of the

1 Chairman of the Committee, because of his 2 sponsorship of the employer's amendment, it will be 3 exceptionally difficult today. Now I am happy --John and I talk all the time. We are happy to kick 4 5 ideas around but it will be difficult today on May 18th. 6 7 TRUSTEE GOODE: This is Trustee Goode. Ι am very concerned about our bill not being 8 9 introduced. It puts us in a very awkward position. 10 Whatever way the bill can get introduced, we need 11 ideas from you all, and to get it done. 12 MR. BLAIDA: I would suggest, with respect, we, number one, file a clean bill with its 13 14 own number. That occurs regularly, with the 15 understanding that today would be a marker. 16 Two, let's see what vehicle on which the 17 County proper files its amendment. Because until 18 we know what bill number it is, it is a difficult philosophical discussion for no other reason that 19 20 again you can't file an amendment on a proposal that currently sits in the Assignments Committee. 21 22 Once we know those two pieces of 23 information, then I think we're able to call 24 another procedural play.

1 But I would suggest, and John obviously 2 can feel free to disagree, there is no harm in 3 filing our bill clean for no other reason than having a number on which to point to. 4 5 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Thank you both. We do not want to show a hostile process at all. 6 7 We're very excited that we even had that conversation with the Senator last week. 8 9 Could we ask for -- could you both 10 together see the Senator and ask for a deferral of 11 the County's legislation until they have had a chance to review all of the issues that came up in 12 13 today's meeting that you were not part of, 14 unfortunately. And, then, two, also work on 15 introducing our bill, as you mentioned, as a new 16 bill so can we do both and I look forward to your 17 comments. 18 MR. MCCABE: If you have a list of issues that you discussed, it would help to have that on a 19 20 piece of paper for us to review and potentially be on a one-page document to Senator Martwick. 21 22 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I get that. We don't 23 have time to debate what our plan is. We have a 24 motion on the table and I appreciate your comment.

1	But the question is, too, we'd like to see if you
2	can defer the County's bill, and, two, introduce
3	our bill. Can that be done?
4	MR. MCCABE: We can request a meeting
5	with Senator Martwick. They have been in caucus
6	this morning so I don't know and both of us will
7	be in the Capital this afternoon. We can request
8	to get in to see him. It depends on what they are
9	doing on the floor or whether they are still in
10	caucus. I think their prime focus right now is
11	going to be an agreement on the Budget and I don't
12	know that there is actual time to actually consider
13	a bill that's the County's bill, that is not even
14	drafted.
15	So, in theory, they would take that
16	language and redraft it, let's say to either our
17	disability or Forest Preserve bill, file it and
18	then have a committee hearing and pass it, send it
19	back to the House for concurrence and a request has
20	been made of the House sponsor to also hold back
21	but there was no confirmation given to that. I
22	still have to check with the unions on the result
23	of their conversation on that same line.
24	One of my conversations a couple of weeks

1	ago with the County lobbyist, I said, you know, we
2	had a bunch of objections two years ago that
3	haven't been acted on. His response was, well, if
4	it doesn't happen now, we can talk over the summer.
5	That was just not their policy, just a possibility
6	that maybe there is still more work to be done.
7	That was more or less conversations between two
8	lobbyists on what is next, but definitely not their
9	position and clearly it is not ours as of right
10	now.
11	You want us to make a visit to Senator
12	Martwick, to say, please, hold the bill. We are
13	not ready for this. We have a number of questions.
14	He will want to hear maybe what the questions are
15	or he maybe want to say I am ready to go.
16	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: John, it is Pat
17	McFadden. I will embarrass myself with this
18	question probably. Where is the bill that our
19	bill today? This second so to speak. With
20	Martwick, Senator Martwick?
21	MR. MCCABE: So, so
22	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: No, I am just asking,
23	where is it?
24	MR. MCCABE: The Senate bills that were

1 introduced, our two bills, one on the Forest 2 Preserve funding, which was always going to be a 3 placeholder for our full bill. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Wait, John. John, 4 5 John, John, I get confused real easily. Where is the bill today sitting? 6 7 MR. MCCABE: Okay. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Here is what I am 8 9 thinking. If it is in Senator Martwick's office, 10 you could walk down the hall and tell him these 11 people want this introduced and have him introduce it or say no. Or, we could write him a letter and 12 13 have it hand delivered asking him to introduce it 14 and try to -- without making a science out of it, 15 broach the subject of why and what we have done to 16 get this far. 17 MR. MCCABE: So, one of our House bills 18 is sitting in Senate Pension Committee. The other one is sitting in the Senate Assignments, which is 19 the same as Rules. It hasn't been assigned. 20 The 21 other two, the Senate version of those bills, were 22 never passed. They were left in Committee and then 23 sent back to Assignments, but the content of the 24 two of them are on Senate Bill 1056, which is in

1	the House on second reading. So the original
2	content is alive but the actual physical bill is in
3	Senate. One bill was sitting in Senate
4	Pensions Committee.
5	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I think that was a
6	yes or no question that Trustee McFadden had.
7	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Which was
8	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Then he changed it
9	because he wanted to get a distinct answer and I
10	think this is the problem that we are having.
11	Can you walk over with a letter from us
12	or explain what we would like done to the Senator
13	explaining why?
14	MR. MCCABE: Yes.
15	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: And, we will have a
16	letter at the end of this day sent to you and Derek
17	and the process should happen together, not
18	separately, not updating one another, because I
19	find that this is very confusing and we need an
20	answer from the two of you in sync. Okay?
21	MR. MCCABE: We will act accordingly.
22	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Okay.
23	PRESIDENT WILSON: Trustee Kouruklis, let
24	me jump in and suggest that we finish the vote. I

1	think we have enough information and then give some
2	instruction afterwards.
3	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Yes, sir. I didn't
4	hear that, but repeat it one more time, please.
5	PRESIDENT WILSON: Just in terms of
6	clarity, we have the motion on the table and we
7	called our consultants in order to make sure that
8	our motion was feasible and accurate. Let's finish
9	the vote before we give directions that the Board
10	has not voted on.
11	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Okay. The reason why
12	we went through that process, it was a very
13	difficult one because of technology issues, but
14	overall what we were trying to do is figure out if
15	our letter that we will present to the lobbyist at
16	the end of today that letter will identify the
17	issues that we found in the County's bill. In
18	addition to that, it is going to request a review
19	of our legislation that we provided a few days ago.
20	We will reintroduce that as another copy to the
21	Senator because our legislation we feel strongly
22	that solves most, if not all, of those issues that
23	the County did not.
24	In addition, we will have the CFL weigh

1	in. If they agree with us, it would be a
2	partnership.
3	PRESIDENT WILSON: Let me ask, I thought
4	you were restating the motion, but it sounds like
5	you are also saying what our intentions and opinion
6	are. Can you restate your motion and let us vote
7	and then come back and clarify or expand as you
8	like?
9	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Yes. So, the motion
10	is to provide our concerns with the County's
11	pension bill in writing to Senator Martwick. In
12	addition, we will be advising that our legislation
13	that we formally wanted to introduce back in March,
14	that didn't, be reviewed by the Senator as a
15	document that we feel strongly should be passed.
16	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I will second it.
17	PRESIDENT WILSON: It was seconded by
18	Trustee Ochalla and you are consenting to the
19	restatement and reaffirming your second.
20	Peggy, please all the roll.
21	MS. FAHRENBACH: Yes, Trustee Wilson.
22	Trustee Blair.
23	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye.
24	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode.

1 TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye. 2 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. 3 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 4 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 5 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. 6 7 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. 8 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. 9 10 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. 11 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 12 13 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 14 Trustee Kouruklis, go ahead and clarify 15 your instructions. 16 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The instructions are 17 that we will today provide a letter to our lobbyist 18 to be hand delivered to Senator Martwick. In addition to that letter, we will have our Labor 19 partners review it and if they agree they would be 20 part of our introduction of our legislation in lieu 21 of the County's in Springfield tomorrow. 22 23 TRUSTEE HUGHES: In order to keep the 24 lines of communication open with the County is the

1	intent to also copy the County on the letter?
2	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Absolutely.
3	TRUSTEE HUGHES: Okay, thank you.
4	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: John, I have a question
5	for you.
6	MR. MCCABE: Go ahead.
7	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: My question is can you
8	give us a summary of where the County's bill stands
9	right now in regards to whether or not it's going
10	to be make it to the floor before the end of
11	session?
12	MR. MCCABE: As of right now, the County
13	bill is not moving. In effect, the only one moving
14	first of all, any live pension bill is germane
15	so he can take any bill and add it on. So, any
16	bill that is out there could be amended and put it
17	on.
18	One of our bills is one of those that is
19	able and available. It is still in Committee. It
20	would have to be posted and come out of Committee.
21	So, there is a requirement of a six day notice.
22	They can waive that but it is live. So, it is
23	possible they could. It could be put on another
24	bill that is out there but then you have to ask

1	that sponsor permission or that organization whose
2	bill it is.
3	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: As of this moment right
4	now, have you received any notification or notice
5	that it is being formulated in that way or we are
6	going to have to deal with this on the floor?
7	MR. MCCABE: No, we have no notice. As
8	Derek explained, it can't go on the bill that they
9	drafted it to but they can go back and redraft it
10	to a live bill. But, in effect, our bill is not
11	live. Our bill is sitting in Committee. While
12	there is time to post it and move it, there is not
13	much more time than that.
14	MR. LEDONNE: Could it be amended to a
15	bill that goes to hearing tomorrow?
16	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: The bill is down
17	there. Get rid of the bill and do the cover
18	letter. Let's go, before these people wakeup and
19	take the higher hand and move. Kevin, isn't that
20	okay?
21	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: In substance, yes. I
22	would technically phrase it differently, but, yes,
23	I think in substance that is what we are trying to
24	say.

1 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Do we need a motion 2 regarding this letter, Mr. President? 3 MR. MCCABE: I think it can be heard 4 tomorrow. 5 PRESIDENT WILSON: It sounds like they raised reiteration of the letter that went to 6 7 Senator Martwick. 8 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Okay. 9 PRESIDENT WILSON: Do you have clear direction there, Madam Executive Director? 10 11 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Gina, do you want to 12 repeat it? 13 MS. TUCZAK: Sure. I am going to draft a 14 letter today, that is going be to hand delivered to 15 our lobbyist -- I'm sorry, it will be emailed to 16 our lobbyist for them to print out and hand deliver 17 to Senator Martwick advising them with respect to 18 our concerns with the County bill. Second, somebody is going to reach out to 19 the Labor partners, that could be me or Trustee 20 21 Kouruklis or Mary Pat, and make sure that they have seen our bill, which I know they have because I 22 23 sent it to them Friday. 24 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Let's decide on who,

1	write down who.
2	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Kevin and I will.
3	After this meeting, we are giving Labor an update.
4	MS. TUCZAK: They already have our bill
5	and then review it and see if they would assist
6	with the introduction of our bill.
7	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: With the introduction
8	or with it after it is introduced?
9	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So, there is
10	opposition to the current bill and then we are
11	going to see if we can get our bill introduced. If
12	we can't get our bill introduced, the idea is to
13	defer the County bill until we can work together on
14	a bill that is doable. That's really the key here,
15	we don't want the current one passed because it
16	doesn't work. We want one that works. If the
17	County wants to work with us, as we have tried in
18	the past for the last almost three years, we are
19	willing to do. And if Labor wants to be part of
20	that, which I am sure they want to be from past
21	discussions, we will include them, too.
22	The key is identify what is wrong with
23	the bill, identify how our bill does work and see
24	if we can get our bill introduced. If we cannot,

1 defer the County's bill until we have agreement. 2 PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. Is there 3 anything else on this matter? TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: We've been here for 4 5 two years and haven't gotten any substantive exchange with these people. Is there a way to put 6 7 a Post-It note on this letter and say that? TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I am assuming we said 8 9 that in the previous letter. We will introduce a 10 paragraph in there that we have worked --11 MS. TUCZAK: There was a paragraph that 12 indicated that we had special board meetings, we 13 have had meetings with elected officials, with 14 executive officers of the County. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I'm sorry to 15 16 interrupt you. The key is on their bill, on their 17 bill, we were never consulted. And, if we were, we 18 wouldn't have so much division between how we feel as a board, as a fund, as fiduciaries, that we have 19 here, as counsel, if they would have worked with us 20 we would not be in this position. 21 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Their bill was introduced 22 23 after you had the meeting? TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Yes. Correct. 24 After

1	they said
2	TRUSTEE BLAIR: After we said it in a
3	working group, right?
4	MS. TUCZAK: Yes. Grant it, at that
5	meeting with Senator Martwick, their action point
6	was they were going to go back and take another
7	pass at the board governance issue but it was never
8	indicated they were just going to go ahead and
9	submit it.
10	TRUSTEE BLAIR: At no point subsequent to
11	that last meeting, did they ever reach out to us
12	and say, hey, here's what we intend to do.
13	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Nor did they before
14	the Martwick meeting. Besides the current language
15	is different than what we saw two years ago.
16	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Senator Martwick should
17	understand, based upon the County's draft, we are
18	not close to agreement on this.
19	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Our members should
20	know. Maybe we should maybe our members should
21	get a notice from the Board saying how this could
22	change their lives. I am not trying to make it
23	difficult but why are we only privy to this? Why
24	aren't retirees informed of what could happen down

1 the road? It is their pensions. We need to think 2 about that for the next meeting. 3 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Or between now and 4 then. 5 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Maybe that should be included in the letter. 6 7 PRESIDENT WILSON: We tried to let 8 everyone have a say. Is there anything else or do 9 we want to keep going? We have a lot there. Ι 10 think everyone has had a chance to express 11 themselves. Are you ready to adjourn at this point or is there more business on this? 12 13 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Move to adjourn. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Second. 14 15 PRESIDENT WILSON: Moved by Trustee 16 McFadden and seconded by Trustee Kouruklis. 17 All in favor please say "Aye". 18 (Chorus of ayes.) 19 PRESIDENT WILSON: The motion passes. We adjourn. Thank you for that vigorous conversation 20 21 and we have a lot of work to do. Thank you. 22 23 24 (WHICH WERE ALL THE PROCEEDINGS
