5	District Annuity and Benefit Fund Board of Trustees
6	for Thursday, August 6th, 2020.
7	For the record, this meeting is a regular
8	meeting of the Board because, while safety
9	precautions and social distancing guidelines are
10	being maintained, we expect to have a quorum of
11	Trustees physically present for the meeting. We
12	further expect, consistent with the Open Meetings
13	Act, that the Trustees who are present will soon
14	vote to allow other Trustees not physically
15	present, to participate by phone.
16	Because of the uncertainty surrounding
17	the COVID-19 pandemic, the Board is going to adhere
18	to the guidance provided by the Governor's July 24,
19	2020 Disaster Proclamation, the Governor's
20	Executive Order Number 42, as well as the
21	provisions of Public Act 101-0640.

2	Consistent with Public Act 91-0715 and
3	reasonable constraints determined by the Board of
4	Trustees, at each meeting of the Board, members of
5	the public may request a brief time to address the
6	Board on relevant matters within its jurisdiction.
7	Are there any requests for public comment
8	today? If any member of the public wants to speak,
9	please identify yourself for the record.
10	Can you introduce yourself and you have
11	three minutes. You are the only one. I don't have
12	a time clock but go ahead.
13	MS. MERRILL: Thank you for your time and
14	the opportunity to address the Board this morning.
15	My name is Martha Merrill and I am the
16	Director of Research and Employee Benefits AFSCME
17	Council 31.
18	On July 24th AFSCME sent a letter to the
19	Board raising concerns over the election rules
20	adopted for the upcoming Trustee election this
21	fall. In short we believe maintaining the current
22	mail balloting procedure, which requires an active
23	employee or annuitant to first request a ballot in
24	order to vote, did not allow for a fair or

1 accessible election if this was the only means by 2 which they could vote. We urged the Board to 3 reconsider the rules and adopt a procedure to allow 4 for a paper ballot to be mailed to all participants 5 and annuitants that are eligible to vote. In followup, AFSCME provided research on 6 7 the voting procedures of other major pension systems in Illinois. There are currently two other 8 9 pension systems that use mail balloting as the 10 primary means of voting. The Illinois Municipal 11 Retirement Fund and the State Employees Retirement Both have straightforward and easily 12 System. replicable voting rules that serve as examples. 13 14 Both pension systems mail all eligible voters a 15 paper ballot along with a postage paid envelope at 16 the beginning of the election period. There is a 17 fixed deadline to return the ballot. If you lose 18 or misplace your ballot you must first sign an affidavit to that affect before you are sent a new 19 20 ballot. And the envelope serves in upholding the 21 integrity of the process. One ballot per envelope 22 and all ballots must be returned in the envelope 23 that is provided by the Pension Fund. The IMRF 24 requires a signature on the ballot as well. If the

1	rules aren't followed, then the ballot is spoiled.
2	Again, simple, straightforward, and
3	accessible. Quickly replicable by the Cook County
4	Pension Fund recognizing the time constraints of
5	the upcoming fall election. And both funds report
6	not having any issues with that voting procedure.
7	In closing I'd like to say AFSCME fully
8	believes in the important role elected trustees
9	play on pension fund boards. As current employees
10	and retirees, Elected Trustees bring a prospective
11	to their decision-making and administration of the
12	Fund that is vital. Elected Trustees are in all
13	senses of the word fully vested in the pension Fund
14	system that they serve. They know how critically
15	important the pension benefits are to the
16	retirement security of those that dedicated a life
17	to public service. And the governance of the Cook
18	County Pension Fund, with the number of Elected
19	Trustees that serve on this Board, is a prime
20	example of governance which we think is so
21	important, and that I believe, we share a common
22	belief in preserving. Imperative to the role of
23	the Elected Trustees is the role of participants
24	voting to elect that representation. And to that

1 point having elections that maximize engagement and 2 participation should be the goal. This is not the 3 first time AFSCME has advocated for election rules 4 that increase participation. 5 AFSCME asks for your consideration of 6 adopting a process that simply replaces the ballot 7 request form with the actual ballot and that you mail it with a return envelope to all active 8 9 employees and annuitants eligible to vote in the 10 upcoming 2020 fall election. 11 Thank you for your time. 12 MS. BURNS: Thank you. 13 Thank you for your PRESIDENT WILSON: 14 comments. 15 I will entertain a motion to approve the 16 minutes of the July 9, 2020 board meeting as well 17 as the July 9, 2020 Open Meetings transcript. 18 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Move. 1 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 2 The next item on the agenda is Review and 3 Consideration of the Election Matters and consideration and possible action in regard to the 4 5 October, 2020 election process. First we will have the motion and then a 6 7 second and then we will have discussion. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I move to rescind the 8 9 prior action of the Board. 10 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Reconsider the prior 11 You want to keep talking about it. action. The motion is to reconsider and a second means that it 12 13 is back up for conversation. 14 MS. BURNS: Correct. 15 PRESIDENT WILSON: Let me get 16 clarification from fiduciary counsel. Counsel said 17 the proper motion is to rescind. 18 MS. BURNS: A motion to reconsider under 19 Robert's Rules is the same day that the action is taken. When the action is taken at a future 20 21 meeting, it is a motion to rescind, which 22 technically means the same thing as a motion to 23 reconsider but it is a different meeting date. 24 Trustee Kouruklis, you were going to make DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1 a motion. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I move to rescind the 2 3 prior action of the Board at the July, 2020 meeting approving the application and ballot process for 4 5 the October, 2020 election. TRUSTEE GOODE: I will second. 6 7 PRESIDENT WILSON: It was moved by 8 Trustee Kouruklis. Seconded by Trustee Goode. Any 9 discussion? 10 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I have a couple of comments I wanted to start off with. 11 I thought the letters we received from 12 13 the unions were thought provoking. I think their 14 points were spot on at the moment. We want to 15 encourage voting throughout the participants and 16 annuitants that are part of this Fund. We do not 17 want any indication that the election process would 18 be at any point lessened or hard to participate 19 since we are looking at removing the in-person 20 process that normally happens during non-covid 21 years. 22 I want to thank the unions for bringing 23 this to our attention after the Board's vote last 24 month and the discussion I have had with many DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1 members on this Board. 2 I also wanted to go through the process. 3 Obviously, I talked to many people about the process from the Fund and people who work with the 4 5 Fund. I think the item here is really regarding the two-step process that we currently have and 6 7 reducing that down to a one-step process. I'd like to hear from other trustees but 8 9 first I really would want to hear from Gina on what 10 the current process is, if you could, in a very short manner. What is the current process and then 11 12 we can talk about the process. MS. TUCZAK: Certainly. 13 The current 14 process, the two-step process, is for every Member 15 that is eligible to participate in the election, 16 based on the criteria of which trustee is up for 17 election, is sent an application. And there's a 18 time period in which they need to sign a verification statement, that indicates their name, 19 20 their address and either their employee ID or their 21 last four digits of their social security and then 22 they have to sign their name. 23 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: And they sign their 24 name where?

1 MS. TUCZAK: They send in the application 2 and once the application is received the 3 information on that verification, which the main thing is the last four digits of your social 4 5 security or your employee ID, is verified with a 6 list that we have provided. And if there is a 7 match, that Member is then sent a ballot. 8 The ballot is in an envelope and when the 9 Member receives the outer envelope they open it up. 10 There is a secrecy envelope, that has no 11 identifiers on it, and a ballot. The Member puts the ballot in the secrecy 12 13 They then enclose it in a larger envelope. 14 envelope. The larger envelope has a barcode that 15 is assigned to you as a member voting and you have 16 to sign the back of the envelope and you have to 17 sign a statement indicating that you hereby voted 18 this ballot and that you signed your name under the 19 penalty of perjury. 20 That outer envelope then goes to the 21 There is daily pickups of those envelopes. PO Box. 22 On the day of the election, all of those ballots 23 are opened. There is a check for a signature and a 24 verification that the barcode matches the system is

1 done. 2 The ballot envelopes are cut open. The 3 secrecy ballot is separated, put into a different pile, and then all of the ballots are tallied. 4 5 That is a summary version. 6 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: When somebody gets a 7 ballot as requested, they get the ballot. They 8 fill it out. They put it into an envelope. Then 9 that envelope goes into the larger envelope. That 10 larger envelope has a barcode that indicates that 11 it is the person that is sending that ballot in. It has some unique identifier. 12 13 MS. TUCZAK: The barcode does, yes. 14 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Then they seal the 15 envelope. They sign the back of the envelope? 16 MS. TUCZAK: You also sign the back of 17 the envelope. 18 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Do you put anything 19 else on the envelope? 20 MS. TUCZAK: You state your name and sign 21 I do have examples. it. 22 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Is there verbiage that 23 you are signing? 24 Would you like me to read MS. TUCZAK: DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 what it says? 2 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Sure. 3 MS. TUCZAK: "I", insert the name, "do 4 hereby verify that I voted this ballot, signed my 5 name to this envelope and mailed said envelope through the U.S. mail. I make this statement and 6 7 sign my name under penalty of perjury". That is 8 what you are signing to on the back of the 9 envelope. 10 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: You are sending that 11 to a PO Box? 12 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 13 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The PO Box is picked 14 up by our election vendor? 15 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 16 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: On a regular basis? 17 MS. TUCZAK: Daily basis. 18 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The two and a half to three weeks that the voting process is open? 19 20 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 21 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: And then they scan 22 the barcode? 23 MS. TUCZAK: On a daily basis, they scan 24 the barcode and do a count of the ballots that came DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 in. 2 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The scanning of the 3 barcode indicates that it is somebody that is part of the Fund? 4 5 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: If for some reason 6 7 there is no scan, it doesn't get opened and that gets put aside, what happens there? 8 9 MS. TUCZAK: If there is no scan or if 10 there is no signature, they are still kept in an 11 envelope with that days mail. On the day of the 12 election when all of these envelopes are brought to 13 the location of the counting, those ballots would be sequestered to the side. 14 15 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: If you do get a 16 positive read on the barcode, the next step is to 17 see if there already has been something that has 18 been received from somebody who possibly had a duplicate ballot and did they vote and if that did 19 not happen then they proceed with opening the 20 21 envelope? 22 MS. TUCZAK: Right. Yes. 23 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: If they haven't 24 previously voted a week ago or a couple of days DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 ago, because possibly they lost it and sent two in, 2 whatever, let's say anything that could happen. 3 The barcode that is being read is what I am trying 4 to say, I want to make sure I am clear, would not 5 allow for a duplicate opening process of opening that ballot. That barcode has an indicator that 6 7 somebody has already voted or did not vote. MS. TUCZAK: Correct. 8 9 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: The barcode has to be 10 connected with a warm body on our list. 11 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 12 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Then it is not just we haven't seen the paper before, it is that this 13 14 specific person has already voted. 15 MS. TUCZAK: Right. 16 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: From your other fund 17 you were at, at the City of Chicago --18 MS. TUCZAK: The Policemen's Fund for the 19 City of Chicago. 20 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Did they have a 21 similar procedure? 22 They had a similar MS. TUCZAK: 23 procedure. They did not have a signature and the 24 statement of certification on the envelope. DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Did they have a 2 request for a ballot? 3 MS. TUCZAK: No, they did not. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: They have simply the 4 5 process that we just talked about without the signature. The barcode, the envelope, without a 6 7 signature. MS. TUCZAK: 8 Right. 9 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: We have that extra 10 layer of signing under penalty of perjury. 11 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 12 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Okay. 13 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: The ballots are not 14 counted the day they come in. They are saved until 15 the end so that if there is a challenge, the 16 candidate can be involved and be there for the 17 process. 18 MS. TUCZAK: That is correct. Each day 19 as the ballots are picked up, the barcode is 20 checked and the count is made on how many ballots 21 came in. And, we, at the Fund get a register as the votes come in so we know who voted. 22 It is all 23 put in an envelope and sealed. 24 On the day of the election all of these DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1 envelopes that are sealed then come to the location 2 of the counting and then they are cut open on that 3 day. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: 4 If there are two bags 5 after you look at the mail that came in today, 6 there is the one bag that will have a couple of 7 envelopes in it that weren't signed and then there will be the other bag with all the rest that appear 8 9 to be certified, signed on the back. 10 MS. TUCZAK: On the day of the election there would be the separating but each day the 11 ballots are kept together in one bag. 12 13 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Okay. 14 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: One more question. 15 We are talking about the signature. If I was a 16 candidate running or any candidate was running for 17 office and they decided that they weren't happy 18 with the results and they wanted to see who voted for that person and they ask that they verify some 19 20 of the ballots that the signatures were actually on 21 the envelope. 22 It's my understanding that we keep an 23 image of all the contents, including the outer part 24 of the envelope that has the barcode and the

1 signature, imaged for our use or if anybody is 2 looking to review a certain item to verify that 3 that person actually signed it. So if I wanted to see an image of that envelope, I could get that? 4 5 MS. TUCZAK: I don't know about that. We have Tim Walsh on the call I believe if you want to 6 7 ask that question of him. We keep the hard copy envelopes for some 8 9 period of time. I don't know what time that is. 10 Whether there is a digital image of each, I don't 11 think so. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Can Mr. Walsh hear 12 13 us? 14 MR. WALSH: Just to answer your question, 15 the materials are kept for a full year. That 16 includes in our current process all applications 17 and all envelopes are saved for a full year in the 18 event of any type of review after the fact. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Okay. 19 Tim, thank you 20 for that. 21 How many other pension funds do you also have a contract with to handle their election 22 23 administrative process? 24 MR. WALSH: In Chicago, currently, the DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 Chicago Municipal Fund has been done for the last 2 ten years. The Chicago Police Pension. The 3 Chicago Park District. Those are the main four and 4 we provide the same service for quite a few labor 5 funds as well, including the Fraternal Order of 6 Police. Any number of the electricians, plumbers, 7 ironworkers. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: From the Pension 8 9 Fund's perspective and the other Pension Funds that 10 you manage the election process, in your opinion, from your expert opinion I guess because you're 11 doing this year after year, are we unique? 12 I was 13 told earlier we were unique in the application 14 process. 15 MR. WALSH: It is definitely somewhat 16 unique in the handful of pension funds. Municipal 17 Fund conducted an onsite election for a long time. 18 They moved over to all by mail without an application and the Park District Fund does an all 19 mail as well. Yes, there are a few other groups, 20 21 labor organizations that I do work with, that do 22 have an application as well but the majority vote 23 by mail; it is a full mail ballot. The validation 24 is based upon that barcode only and that is where

1 the efficiency comes in. 2 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: We are one of the few 3 that has the signature and the barcode? 4 MR. WALSH: The signature component --5 they all have a barcode and a validation in the 6 ballot packet that was mailed to the members as 7 processed through the post office. Then coming back is validated off of that barcode is how all of 8 9 the other vote by mail processes do. 10 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So I know you said 11 they all have the barcode but do they not have the signature or do they have the signature? 12 13 MR. WALSH: They do not have the 14 signature. 15 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: We have an extra 16 layer it sounds like that we have had for a long 17 time. 18 MR. WALSH: Correct. As long as I have been involved, there's been a signature on the 19 20 application as well as the ballot. 21 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Okay. Thank you. 22 TRUSTEE BLAIR: I have a question about 23 the barcode process. Your technology gives or 24 assigns a barcode because we have an identified DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1 pool of voters? 2 MR. WALSH: Correct. 3 TRUSTEE BLAIR: So they would be assigned 4 a unique identifier based on that barcode, right? 5 MR. WALSH: Correct. 6 TRUSTEE BLAIR: So they go through the 7 mail process. They do all the envelopes. They certify with their signature on the back. 8 They 9 drop it in the mail. It comes back to you. Your 10 technology scans that barcode coming back in, 11 right? 12 MR. WALSH: Correct. 13 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Is there any way that 14 somebody could duplicate a barcode or would your 15 technology or your safety system, the safety net, 16 flag that barcode saying we have already received a 17 ballot for that individual? 18 MR. WALSH: That is exactly right. The barcode is nothing more than the voter ID for that 19 If there was a second ballot mailed or 20 individual. 21 some sort of a fraudulent ballot, when that voter 22 ID is entered in, either barcode scanned or key 23 entered in, the barcode is visible on the envelope 24 as well. It flags it and it indicates exactly

1	where it was, if it was previously scanned, and
2	that was generally brought to the Independent
3	Election Administrator for determination.
4	We have not over the years ever had a
5	fraudulent packet, but we have had a ballot that a
6	second one was requested and those were limited but
7	the system validates that there is only one that
8	comes in and a determination would be made by the
9	Independent Election Administrator to whether they
10	keep one or the other or none.
11	TRUSTEE BLAIR: That was my next
12	question, if you identified some type of a
13	fraudulent voting scheme with this scanning
14	process.
15	MR. WALSH: No. No. No, we have not.
16	The process of the packet validating on the back
17	end, and cross-checking, they check for any
18	duplicates. Every organization has its own rules.
19	If a second ballot is allowed, it does check that
20	it confirms and then is brought to the attention of
21	the Independent Election Administrator. No, I have
22	not encountered that where there's been any fraud
23	attempted on that.
24	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Thank you.
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1 TRUSTEE HUGHES: This is Trustee Hughes. 2 How do you verify that there is I have a question. 3 not some mixup? What internal controls do you have in place to insure the integrity of the ballot? 4 5 MR. WALSH: We validate the file that comes over with in this case the active member, 6 7 which is just approximately just under 20,000 individual records. A unique ID is sent, which 8 9 ultimately results in that being their unique barcode as well. That file generally I will spot 10 11 check and send back a copy to confirm that we received the file with 19,900, you know, records. 12 13 Whatever that number might be. Just confirming 14 that this is exactly what we had before it goes to 15 the printer. It is essentially spot checking that 16 we have an unique process on there. 17 We are also double checking against the 18 original file. Once you are even touching the file 19 to assign a voter ID, validating again to make sure 20 there was no manipulation or change to the address 21 itself. Just spot checking against the original 22 file is also part of that validation before it goes 23 to the printer. 24 **TRUSTEE HUGHES:** Who does that?

1 MR. WALSH: We do it internally. There 2 is a couple of people that do it. The mailing 3 house is a company that fulfills the actual mailing 4 It is checked on my end before it goes components. 5 out and then they are working with the data base on 6 a daily basis when updates are made. 7 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Thank you. MS. BURNS: We have a motion and a second 8 9 to rescind the prior action of the Board. 10 PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there any more 11 discussion on the motion? 12 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Before we do, yes, I have 13 If this goes to a vote and maybe this a question. 14 is a question more for Mr. Walsh. We are on the 15 clock. We are right around the corner from trustee 16 application or trustee application packets being 17 available to County employees that want to run. 18 I was an elected trustee and I know the I had to do it. I came down here and sat 19 process. 20 and I received that packet and the instructions. 21 Do we have enough time from the minute we 22 take this vote to the minute that the doors open in 23 the Pension Fund on that Monday morning to have 24 this process in place?

1 And here's why I say that because they 2 have one week to get those signatures in, correct? 3 Is Brent on? Brent, is it three weeks to get the 4 signatures in? MR. LEWANDOWSKI: The petition packets 5 6 can begin to be picked up August 20th and the first 7 day to submit them is Tuesday September 1st, so 12 8 days. 9 TRUSTEE BLAIR: So 12 days the packet has 10 to be complete. When is the last date? 11 MR. LEWANDOWSKI: September 4th. 12 The packet has to be TRUSTEE BLAIR: 13 consistent from the very first date it becomes 14 available. 15 Will we be able to have the rules and the 16 process in place? This goes back to the July 6th 17 meeting. Look, I think we all agreed that the 18 process had to be improved. I mean, we disenfranchised voting by having in-person voting 19 in the County Building, to be honest. 20 21 I could put a voting booth by the county 22 jail between 26th Street and South Campus. We 23 probably could have had 3,000 walk-in votes as 24 opposed to 118 North Clark.

1 We recognize that. We did. We all 2 agreed that we needed to improve the process even 3 prior to receiving the letters from our unions. So 4 we as a board recognize that and we agree. 5 Do we have enough time, if we vote today 6 to change it, to have those packets available in 12 7 days or the language that has to be in the packet? 8 You know what I mean? It has to be the same. 9 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I have a question. Trustee Blair talked about what we have to have in 10 11 the packet. Is that something that is required by the Pension Code? I am confused on the -- if I am 12 13 looking to get my petition, do I need to know if 14 somebody is going to have a two-step process or 15 one-step process in the ballot, in the voting 16 process, why not when -- if you really want to know 17 the process, when you are able to get your 100 18 signatures, whatever the quantity is, then you get here's how people are going to vote for you. 19 20 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Having run in an 21 election, I want to know the rules from the very 22 I want to know how I am going to beginning. 23 operate as a candidate and I want to make sure that 24 I am operating within those rules, right, because

1	that is what happens. I want to make sure we have
2	enough time to get that done, that is my question.
3	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The election process
4	for somebody to go get petitions
5	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Let's set the petition
6	aside. The election is up on October 28th but our
7	candidates have to know the process of election
8	because everybody knows you can come down and vote
9	in-person.
10	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I guess what I am
11	trying to say is why does the Pension Fund may
12	be helpful because they already have a process in
13	place for the last 10, 15 years. Now within this
14	Covid era we have to make some changes. We have to
15	provide a packet of the process for the people
16	submitting their petitions when they submit their
17	petitions.
18	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Because they are
19	entitled to know everything from front to back.
20	The day they pickup a petition they are entitled to
21	know everything. If you don't know and the packet
22	doesn't have everything in the world you ever want
23	to know, then somebody is going to come up behind
24	you after you picked up your petitions and

1 introduce something that is different. 2 TRUSTEE BLAIR: We all recognize there is 3 an issue. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: It is not two 4 5 different processes. It is one. It is one election. You never ran, number one. Number two, 6 7 when you decide to run, you come in, you get the 8 packet. You're done. Everything on god's green 9 earth that you want to know what is going on is right here in this packet. You don't come back 10 with your petitions after you ran down 100 people 11 12 and get the rules. 13 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I get that. Let's be 14 specific on which rules you're talking about. 15 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: All of them. 16 Everything you wanted to know. TRUSTEE BLAIR: Brent is here. 17 So, 18 Brent, on Day 1 the packet is available. What is in the packet that is available to a candidate that 19 20 is going to run for office? 21 MR. LEWANDOWSKI: So we have members that 22 come in that don't know exactly what being a 23 trustee -- what the job entails. So we have our 24 first portion of the packet is considering

1 candidacy and describes what the --2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Can I interrupt for a 3 second? 4 PRESIDENT WILSON: Please, let him 5 answer. 6 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I want to ask a 7 question. PRESIDENT WILSON: You are out of order, 8 9 Pat. You have talked. Let somebody else have a 10 chance. 11 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Do you do anything --12 PRESIDENT WILSON: Disregard this and finish answering the question. 13 14 TRUSTEE BLAIR: I just want to hear what 15 is in the packet. 16 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: This is all he wants 17 to know. 18 PRESIDENT WILSON: You don't have to talk 19 over everybody. Let somebody have a chance and 20 then you can talk. 21 MR. LEWANDOWSKI: It describes what the 22 job is and a brief overview of what the election 23 is. There is also a candidate's statement 24 instructional sheet that after you submit the DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1 petition it is your option to submit a candidate 2 statement that will be posted on the website so 3 voters can get to know the person that is running for the position. There is also a copy of the 4 5 rules so they understand the rules of the election 6 and there is also the petitions for the active 7 employee. Four collection of papers in the packet TRUSTEE BLAIR: To followup with that, we 8 9 have talked about a timeline because it has to be available by the 20th. We have 12 days. 10 That packet would have to be the same on that first day, 11 that is all I am saying. Do we have enough time? 12 13 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Mr. Walsh, who 14 administers the process, said that we have a 15 barcode and a signature and I think what the next 16 motion is going to be, I am not really 100 percent 17 sure we don't have that yet, we are just rescinding 18 right now, but the next motion would be the 19 process. 20 If we eliminate the first process, which 21 is the application, somebody correct me if I am 22 wrong, the second process basically remains the 23 same. 24 To answer your question, based on not DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1	knowing the motion right now, but if the question
2	is we have a two-step process, we eliminate the
3	first process and the second process remains the
4	same.
5	From Mr. Walsh's perspective, he would
6	have to answer that question, but I would like to
7	hear do we have enough time to do Step 2 without
8	Step 1?
9	MR. WALSH: In my opinion, if everybody
10	is getting a ballot but at the back end of the
11	daily pickups remain the same and the validation of
12	whether a signature is present as to qualify it to
13	be eligible, if that process if that daily
14	pickup on the back end does not change, we are
15	still doing that and processing that, the only
16	factor that changes there is the unknown of how
17	much we are processing. But it can be managed on a
18	day-to-day basis, if that is the decision that the
19	back end doesn't change. We are still doing daily
20	pickups. Scanning that into the system.
21	Separating any that did not have that signature.
22	It is somewhat unique in my experience of
23	running a vote by mail where it is just a barcode,
24	but as far as a process to get entered into the

1	system that shouldn't directly impact it depending
2	on what that turnout turns to be throughout the
3	course of the two and a half, three weeks.
4	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I think the setup and
5	the process to implement that, and I get the back
6	end part where you have to actually do it, but put
7	it together. I think what Trustee Blair is trying
8	to get to is we don't want any surprises. And I
9	know there may be a slight change but we don't
10	really know the motion because we're not there yet.
11	If we just stick to removing Step 1 and
12	sticking to Step 2 is there something that you need
13	to do, to make sure that you can do, so to Trustee
14	Blair's point, you can include that in the
15	instructional guide that the petitioners will
16	receive on the 20th of August?
17	MR. WALSH: As far as the front end and
18	doing the mailing, the ballot packet, as opposed to
19	the notice and application, we can accomplish that
20	as well as long as I think some of the comments
21	here about the point of knowing exactly the rules
22	as to what it is we are doing. Laying those rules
23	out as to everybody getting a ballot, still a daily
24	pickup and then the process of how that is

1 processed on election day itself, because of the 2 potential for an increased turnout and where that 3 is going to be and how much with Covid and separation how many support people we would need to 4 5 do that. That is all factors we have to know in my 6 opinion to determine whether I can comfortably say 7 it is a go ahead to do it. Operationally doing the mailing of the 8 9 ballot, yes, there is enough time for that. And 10 that is, like I said, it all ties in together. It ties into how we are processing during that three 11 week period and the process and who is overseeing 12 13 that as an IEA on the day of. 14 So there is definitely some questions. 15 It is definitely doable but clarification on that 16 is definitely necessary before committing to it. 17 MS. TUCZAK: If I may add one item in 18 terms of what Tim Walsh does, it is obviously critical, but the election rules, which are as 19 20 Brent said are distributed to the petitioners, that 21 is something that the Board approves. Tim Walsh 22 doesn't writeup the rules. 23 We have a marked up version of the rules 24 to reflect there is no in-person voting this year.

1	But if there were to be a motion to change the
2	two-step, the rules would have to go back and make
3	some more changes. I want to make sure that is
4	clear. The rules are the Board's document that the
5	Board approves.
6	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: What I think Trustee
7	McFadden and Trustee Blair wanted to know is if
8	I think we get the idea of putting the rules
9	together. We don't want to agree to the rules,
10	unless they are okay with changing the process.
11	TRUSTEE BLAIR: I think that was a key
12	element that we didn't have on July 6th. We say,
13	hey, this process can be done and we all agreed the
14	process needs to be changed.
15	TRUSTEE HUGHES: This is Trustees Hughes,
16	if I may make a comment. In July, we had a pretty
17	thoughtful discussion and narrowed it down to the
18	two options. I think one was I guess the two-step
19	mail-in process and the other option was the one
20	mail-in process. I do think the Board gave it a
21	lot of consideration. When I got the letters from
22	the unions, I don't think the letters reflected
23	that properly. There was a thoughtful discussion.
24	I think the trustees were concerned about

1	whether it can be done in time and fraud concerns.
2	I am going to direct a question to the Executive
3	Director. Do you feel those concerns would be
4	alleviated based on further analysis of the
5	different options that we have discussed?
6	Gina, what do you feel with regard to the
7	timeline?
8	MS. TUCZAK: I think the timeline is
9	fine. One of the elements of the two-step process
10	that I thought was valid was the verification form
11	that a Member has to complete. Where they have to
12	write the last four digits of their social security
13	and sign and then mail that in so that is
14	eliminated. There was a little bit more fraud
15	protection with that.
16	One idea that I had is that if you do a
17	one-step, which is possible and I am hoping to go
18	with that, we still have some type of verification
19	card that is included in the one-step mailing.
20	Where there is not just the ballot and the secrecy
21	envelope but an actual verification card that a
22	person would have to still write their name, the
23	last four digits of their social security, sign it
24	and enclose it with the second secrecy ballot.

1 Trustee Ochalla actually had kind of 2 described something like that at the last meeting 3 and I have to think about it. But that would make me feel a little bit 4 5 better with respect to the fraud element. But it 6 would still be a one-step mailing, just that the 7 Member would get a verification card, secrecy envelope and secrecy ballot. 8 9 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: How do you tie the barcode to the employee? 10 11 MR. WALSH: It's just a reference number to that individual's record. It is a reference to 12 13 their record. So when it is pulled up, you pull up 14 the full record of whatever is available; the first 15 name, last name, address, any other fields that 16 have been provided. 17 Just to clarify the difference, in terms 18 of being able to process in a timely fashion, if we 19 are talking about, as I previously mentioned that this is doable, if the second stage mimics what we 20 21 currently do. The signature is on the outside of 22 the envelope and when it comes from the PO Box, it 23 is scanned in first and then the record is pulled 24 up and it is validated. The signature has to be

1 there. It is not a signature check. We don't have 2 a signature on file. That is done on a daily basis 3 and then it is considered updated and in the bag 4 secured. 5 If a signature card is used and that is inside the return envelope, we wouldn't be able to 6 7 do that until election day and that becomes a total unknown of our capabilities of having enough staff 8 9 in limited Covid setting, we are trying to 10 eliminate as many people for support, that adds 11 complication to it. 12 I understand the need for it but I would 13 say having a signature on the envelope and being 14 capable of doing it as it comes back in on a daily 15 basis and then being able to process it 16 immediately, could facilitate that, because of the 17 unknown increased participation. 18 I do think that an internal signature card that we are referring to adds an element that 19 20 I have never done and possibly delays the day of 21 processing, that would overlap into a day -depending on what the return of 20,000 is, that is 22 23 an unknown that I am not familiar with. So that 24 component I am a little -- I understand the need

1	for the signature but that use of it does not
2	since I have never done that, right now I wouldn't
3	be able to say for sure it could be done in a
4	timely fashion by the end of a business day on
5	election day, depending on that turnout, if that
6	turns into validating each one as it's done on
7	election day. So that is the thought I had on
8	that.
9	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: How confident are you
10	in the barcode system using only the past ten years
11	that you have effectively with that system that we
12	currently use, weeded out an type of duplicates or
13	frauds or those types of ballots?
14	MR. WALSH: I am very confident in the
15	barcode process. It's been adopted by all of my
16	private labor unions and pension funds that do vote
17	by mail.
18	Again, that component is your comfort
19	level beyond that. I am very comfortable and the
20	other organizations I have worked with have been
21	comfortable and confident in the barcode component
22	as the primary validation without the signature.
23	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: And we have secondary
24	with the signature on the envelope and affiant
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1 statement as well so we actually have two forms of 2 verification. The signature in and of itself and 3 there is an attestation to that it is an employee 4 or annuitant ballot. We have earmarked coding 5 system so really what we are talking about is a 6 tertiary level with an internal card. 7 MR. WALSH: If that is added, that is an unknown and just operationally I do now know what 8 9 that looks like and how long that would take to 10 process. 11 As far as the question about the barcoding we have done and the comfort level I have 12 13 with that and the other organizations that do use 14 it as a primary, I have been very comfortable with 15 it. It is obviously an unique decision of your 16 group. 17 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Mr. Walsh, what data 18 fields are in the barcode itself? MR. WALSH: The barcode itself is just a 19 20 five digit randomly generated voter ID for that 21 member and uniquely assigned. 22 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Okay. 23 PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there any other 24 discussion on the motion? DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

1 Hearing none, Peggy, please call the 2 roll. 3 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The motion is to 4 rescind the prior action of the Board at the July, 5 2020 meeting. 6 MS. BURNS: Which action approved a 7 two-step process; the application and a ballot. 8 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair. 9 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye. 10 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode. 11 TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye. 12 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. 13 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye. 14 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 15 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 16 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. 17 18 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. 19 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. 20 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 21 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 22 Thank you. 5	PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there a second?

7	TRUSTEE BLAIR: I would like to add one
8	thing. I don't know if this is the place to do it
9	but do we want to do this just for this election?
10	Do we want to do it just for this election to
11	insure that it is functional, it works, it works to
12	the benefit of the trustee that is running or the
13	candidates that are running, to make sure
14	everything is smooth because we have never done
15	that?
16	MS. BURNS: That was the motion, the
17	motion was it is limited to the October, 2020
18	election.
19	PRESIDENT WILSON: I had a second. Any
20	discussion on this motion?
21	TRUSTEE HUGHES: I have a question with
22	regard to how we're getting the postage. Are we
23	putting postage on the mail-in ballot or is that
24	still where the member has to provide postage?
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1	PRESIDENT WILSON: Madam Executive
2	Director.
3	MS. TUCZAK: So the past practice has
4	been that the member affixes the postage to the
5	envelope to mail the ballot or other communication,
6	that has been the past practice.
7	PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. Thank you.
8	Any other questions or comments on the
9	motion?
10	Peggy, please, call the roll.
11	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair.
12	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye.
13	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode.
14	TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye.
15	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes.
16	TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye.

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1	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson.
2	PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye.
3	Thank you, very much. This is very
4	important and thank you for your diligence in
5	discussing this matter.
6	The next item is retention of an attorney
7	regarding election matters. Gina, let me give that
8	to you.
9	MS. TUCZAK: Thank you. At the last
10	board meeting we put on the record that the
11	Independent Election Administrator, Joe Griseta,
12	resigned his position and the Board accepted that
13	resignation and terminated his contract.
14	As part of that discussion, the Board had
15	requested that an election attorney, I believe that
16	is the right term, be considered as a replacement
17	of some of the responsibilities of the Independent
18	Election Administrator and fiduciary counsel had
19	been charged with looking into some candidates for
20	this vendor role.
21	So fiduciary counsel, behind Tab 3-B, has
22	provided you a memo and some resumes of two
23	candidates and with that I was going to turn it
24	over to Mary Pat to discuss the work that she has
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1 done on this. 2 MS. BURNS: Thank you, Gina. 3 Again, if you recall at the last meeting, you directed us to see if we could find someone who 4 5 would work just for the October, 2020 election, because in this election we will not have an 6 7 Independent Election Administrator, but rather an election committee that has previously been 8 9 approved. This lawyer would work with the 10 committee to resolve any disputes that the 11 committee did not feel comfortable either handling itself or allowing fiduciary counsel to address. 12 13 As Gina indicated, we went out and asked 14 for recommendations from the various election 15 boards at the county, city and the state. We then 16 came up with two names; Ms. Goodman and Mr. Welch. 17 Both of these individuals have experience serving 18 either as attorneys or as election hearing officers 19 or election lawyers in both the county, state and 20 city level in similar elections. Their resumes are 21 attached. 22 Both of them, based on my conversations, 23 seemed extremely competent and able to do the job. 24 They agreed to serve for this particular election, DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1	October, 2020, at the rate of \$200 per hour capped
2	at \$30,000 unless we came back to the Board.
3	Further, they both are interested in
4	serving on an ongoing basis as the Election
5	Administrator, if you decided to do that in the
6	future, or just stay available as a retained
7	attorney. So, to conclude, they are both
8	interested in a long term relationship with this
9	fund.
10	And, further, attached to the materials
11	is the letter agreement, which is exactly the same
12	agreement that Mr. Griseta signed, updated and
13	limited to the October, 2020 election. This
14	agreement is just limited to that one election and
15	the agreement is attached. The suggestion, if the
16	Board was comfortable, would be for the Board to
17	identify one of the individuals and then allow us
18	to have that letter agreement executed with that
19	individual which would then make this person
20	available to the Election Committee on a very short
21	basis to assist in finalizing any of the matters
22	that need to be finalized prior to August 20th
23	petitions being mailed.
24	TRUSTEE GOODE: Are we paying this
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1 attorney the same thing that we paid Mr. Griseta? 2 MS. BURNS: It is actually a little 3 cheaper, Trustee Goode, because he was up a little I rounded it down to \$200 because I think 4 higher. 5 he was getting maybe 210, 215. Just so that you 6 can get a chance to see what these people are like 7 before you committed to a long-term relationship with them. But, yes, it is a little cheaper. 8 9 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I am going to make one 10 comment, that I don't want to be part of this 11 discussion as obviously I am the one facing election. One of the attorneys did not want to be 12 13 I think it would be good for the board in-person. to talk to Mr. Walsh about if there are things that 14 15 would be hindered virtually. 16 MS. BURNS: Again, trustees need to speak 17 up because we are recording this. 18 Trustee Ochalla is questioning the fact that one of the individuals who may be able to 19 20 serve as the retained attorney indicated that she 21 did not want to be physically present at the election due to the Covid situation. But I would 22 23 remind the trustees that this person is serving in 24 a very limited capacity for the October, 2020

1	election. They are there as a resource to the
2	Election Committee to resolve disputes and that
3	both staff and my office, which is in this
4	building, would make themselves physically
5	available to do some of the more physical things
6	that Mr. Griseta did in the past. For instance, he
7	would be at the office when the ballots got
8	counted, stand behind the last person in line,
9	those kind of things we think we could do so we
10	want you to pick the candidate or individual that
11	you are more comfortable with and we will workout
12	the rest of the details.
13	Again, it is limited to the October, 2020
14	election.
15	TRUSTEE GOODE: Another question. Please
16	refresh my memory as to why we talked about having
17	a committee and we haven't had one? If we're
18	hiring this person to be the administrator and then
19	we also have the other group, why do we need a
20	committee again, if this attorney is going to do
21	the same thing that Griseta did?
22	MS. BURNS: I don't know if I can speak
23	to why the Board chose to do it.
24	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I can say something.
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1	I wish that last month we had a laundry list of
2	what this Griseta fellow did. And I understand
3	your question and I am wondering myself what the
4	expectation is from these three trustees.
5	If someone comes in and for instance
6	suggests I am having trouble collecting petitions
7	and the people don't want to put the last four
8	characters of their social on and they say can we
9	get a waiver on this, because it is written in the
10	rules, isn't it?
11	MS. BURNS: Yes.
12	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: If it is written in
13	the rules, these three trustees can turn around and
14	say, no, it is written in the rules. We can't
15	waive that and that to my way of thinking would be
16	the end of it.
17	If it is minor administrative issues that
18	would come up, if it is something that is already
19	reduced to writing, then that would be the response
20	I would say. If it is not reduced to writing and
21	somebody picks up on a quirky thing in the process,
22	then it would have to go out.
23	TRUSTEE GOODE: The committee is
24	basically working on the back end to resolve any
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1 issues or challenges, if there is a challenge. 2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I would think the 3 committee is working from the same day that people pickup petitions, if the people that pickup 4 5 petitions and the package have a question then --TRUSTEE BLAIR: The committee of three 6 7 would address those administrative issues. If someone is challenging a signature on a petition, I 8 9 would probably suspect we would let that 10 independent auditor -- right, auditor? 11 MS. BURNS: Attorney. The attorney would review 12 TRUSTEE BLAIR: 13 that claim. We would handle the administrative 14 things. 15 PRESIDENT WILSON: Let me jump in. My 16 understanding was there is some very 17 straightforward administrative things that we could 18 do ourselves and not incur a fee for, such as what Pat explained as the example he gave, and the 19 committee could do that to fill that void in part. 20 21 I also thought that as we are going into 22 a new process and there is conversation about the 23 election because of the pandemic that we hadn't had 24 before, that things that didn't require policy

1	decision, management could interact with the
2	committee on and as long as it wasn't a substantial
3	issue they could get guidance from that committee
4	without convening the full board.
5	And so very straightforward items could
6	be handled by the committee and save us money and
7	having to convene a special board meeting.
8	Is that everyone else's understanding as
9	well?
10	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: That is my
11	understanding and I don't know I am reticent to
12	think it is a good idea.
13	TRUSTEE GOODE: I just want to be
14	reminded. The only other issue I had, because this
15	is a whole entirely new section, those of you that
16	have been on the Board with me before, I have
17	raised this issue. Why is the committee only
18	limited to the legislative members?
19	PRESIDENT WILSON: The thought was, as I
20	recall, a matter related to legislation and that
21	was the motion. However, the slate that I proposed
22	includes one non-member which I was going to note
23	when we got to that part of the agenda.
24	TRUSTEE GOODE: Okay.
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1	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Can I talk?
2	PRESIDENT WILSON: You can.
3	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I would like to move
4	that we rescind that motion on the three person
5	committee and not start over, but revisit it with
6	the idea being that the President name three people
7	to be in this limited committee for this specific
8	election only and the committee doesn't exist after
9	the election as such and that he appoint the three
10	people. We leave it out of Finance Committee or
11	Legislative Committee or any other committee.
12	I think we're putting three trustees in
13	an awkward position. It is simple enough to say,
14	yes, Social Security numbers are required. The
15	last four anyways. Would there be a more effective
16	way to do it? Would you hand the phone to him and
17	say call our fiduciary counsel. Then that doesn't
18	sound very workable either.
19	So that is why I made a motion to rescind
20	that three person subcommittee of the Legislative
21	Committee that was moved last meeting.
22	TRUSTEE GOODE: I second.
23	PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. Any discussion?
24	So my discussion is it sounded like were you saying
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1	no subcommittee or you're saying just not of
2	Legislation because I thought I heard you have
3	three people and their tenure would expire after
4	this election.
5	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Where I was going was
6	not make it part of the Legislative Committee.
7	PRESIDENT WILSON: Right.
8	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: You appoint three
9	people to do this for us.
10	PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. That was going
11	to be my motion.
12	MS. BURNS: You have a motion by Trustee
13	McFadden, seconded by Goode, to rescind that
14	portion of the action on July 9th that was to
15	establish an Election Committee out of the
16	Legislative Committee members.
17	PRESIDENT WILSON: Any more discussion?
18	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Yes, thank you, that
19	is my motion.
20	PRESIDENT WILSON: Roll call, please,
21	Peggy.
22	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair.
23	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye.
24	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode.
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1 TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye. 2 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. 3 **TRUSTEE HUGHES:** Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 4 5 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 6 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. 7 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye. 8 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. 9 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. 10 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. 11 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Present. 12 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 13 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. MS. BURNS: Now there has to be a motion. 14 15 PRESIDENT WILSON: We have something on 16 the floor. We kind of jumped around and didn't 17 resolve the attorney point but I would like a 18 motion that a subcommittee be established that 19 includes Trustee McFadden, Trustee Hughes and 20 Trustee Blair. Trustee McFadden, I'd like you to 21 be in charge of that and then get comfortable with 22 the scope of duties. 23 We went through a conversation about some 24 of the things that they would do last month. Ι

1	don't recall a definite list but I think that
2	certainly it should be within the comfort
3	parameters and not involve anything that is
4	subjective and that exposes the Trustees or the
5	Fund to exposure where you are making decisions
6	that you commented on that are not explicit or
7	could affect the election. Can we get a second? I
8	needed a second before we get into discussion. I
9	have a second.
10	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Who were the trustees?
11	PRESIDENT WILSON: Trustee McFadden,
12	Trustee Hughes, Trustee Blair.
13	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: This would be the
14	PRESIDENT WILSON: Ad hoc subcommittee
15	for helping this is really busy work. This is
16	not people going out making policy and directing
17	how the election will be held. These are people
18	that are volunteering to put time in to do some of
19	the work because of the situation we have ourselves
20	in with the voting process and losing a consultant.
21	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So moved.
22	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I would make a
23	suggestion I would ask Diahann Goode if she were
24	willing to that, if you would be on board with

1 this. 2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Take me off and put 3 Diahann. PRESIDENT WILSON: 4 I am not opposed to 5 Trustee Goode but I will tell you how I made that decision. I made the decision on the availability 6 7 of that person to be present to be able to respond on a timely basis and commit time. 8 9 There are a number of people that I know 10 have a vested interest in this matter and I just 11 personally did not think that they had the 12 flexibility or the time to commit to what might be 13 required. 14 So while I recognize that, that is why I 15 passed Trustee Goode and others. But if you, 16 Trustee Goode, can tell us that you have the 17 flexibility to be available to return calls and to 18 spend time as needed, that is fine. I did not appreciate the strategic considerations and 19 20 representations but we really need somebody who has 21 got time. TRUSTEE GOODE: I have the time. 22 My 23 circumstances have changed. 24 PRESIDENT WILSON: So based on Trustee DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 McFadden's comment, I am comfortable substituting 2 Trustee Goode for Trustee McFadden. 3 But now I would just tell you that others may feel that the Department of Corrections now is 4 5 dominating so what you now have created is 6 something that --7 MS. BURNS: That is my concern. PRESIDENT WILSON: 8 I am not totally --9 after I said that outloud I am not sure that I am 10 comfortable. 11 TRUSTEE GOODE: It is two different 12 departments. 13 That may seem like PRESIDENT WILSON: 14 that from your prospective, but does anybody else 15 have concerns? I mean, I am getting concerns from 16 fiduciary counsel so I should just stop there, that 17 is enough. 18 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: My big question is if I was still in the bunch of three my first thing 19 20 would be to look to staff to get a laundry list of 21 what this fiduciary counsel was doing. The 22 fiduciary counsel I think was present on the day 23 after Labor Day when people submit their petitions. 24 He would be the person to say, well, it is nine

1	o'clock. You're the first in line and someone
2	comes in the door two minutes later and says, well,
3	sorry, it is past nine o'clock and you were the
4	first in line. He did that, right?
5	MS. BURNS: The Independent Election
6	Administrator did that.
7	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: He would look at the
8	pages to see if there is 100 signatures here at
9	least.
10	MR. LEWANDOWSKI: He would submit a
11	receipt to the member.
12	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I am looking where he
13	touched something that is going to be touchy. It
14	is going to be sensitive or something. And on
15	election day someone said that he stands behind the
16	voter that is in line at seven o'clock. If someone
17	comes around the corner at seven of course, we
18	are not doing in-house. If someone came around at
19	7:05, I'm sorry, you are late. The polls are
20	closed. That kind of stuff.
21	I would think fiduciary counsel could do
22	these things. The only thing that the three would
23	be doing would be a sample with the Social
24	Security.

1 PRESIDENT WILSON: So, first of all, I 2 would like to ask Trustee McFadden to rescind his 3 change. I would also like to ask Trustee Ochalla to be open minded or flexible on this. 4 5 I think that what you have seen from the 6 discussion today from the change in the vote that 7 this is a very open minded process that does not have any bipartisan position that is one way or the 8 9 other. You had unanimous support with additional 10 information provided. So I don't see a great deal 11 of exposure to one group versus another. TRUSTEE GOODE: I have a solution. 12 Just 13 keep it the way that you suggested it. McFadden, 14 Hughes and Blair and then allow other Trustees to 15 sit in if they want to. 16 PRESIDENT WILSON: Subject to our 17 exposure on Open Meetings Act, and I am not sure 18 what our limit is there, but you certainly can -what is our maximum that we can have in a meeting 19 before we --20 21 MS. BURNS: It's just a majority of a 22 quorum of any subcommittee. 23 This committee, to Trustee McFadden's 24 point, likely would be consulted by phone. Where I DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

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1 would pick up the phone and talk to each individual 2 trustee rather than ever get a meeting, which then 3 would make it hard to accommodate Trustee Goode's 4 request that she be included. In other words, 5 these things that come up, mostly are issues that 6 are going to be addressed by staff. 7 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I will withdraw my recommendation. Please proceed with Trustees 8 9 McFadden, Trustee Hughes and Trustee Blair. 10 PRESIDENT WILSON: McFadden, you're back 11 on. 12 Roll call, please, Peggy. 13 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I didn't step out of 14 the room to reconsider on purpose. 15 TRUSTEE WILSON: The motion is to appoint 16 Trustees Blair, McFadden and Hughes to the ad hoc 17 subcommittee for the 2020 October election. 18 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair. 19 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye. 20 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode. 21 TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye. 22 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. 23 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye. 24 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 2 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. 3 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye. 4 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. 5 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. Trustee Ochalla. 6 MS. FAHRENBACH: 7 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Present. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 8 9 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 10 Thank you, that motion passes. Thank 11 you, very much. 12 Let's go back to the attorney. 13 MS. BURNS: Again, this would be the 14 person who would just supplement what staff, 15 fiduciary counsel and the election subcommittee is 16 doing. 17 TRUSTEE GOODE: I make a motion we choose 18 Matthew M. Welch. 19 PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there a second? 20 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Trustee Hughes here. Ι 21 apologize. I didn't hear Trustee Goode. 22 TRUSTEE GOODE: I make a motion that we 23 choose Matthew M. Welch. 24 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Thank you. DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1	PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there a second?
2	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I will second it.
3	PRESIDENT WILSON: Discussion?
4	Hearing none, roll call, please.
5	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair.
6	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye.
7	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode.
8	TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye.
9	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes.
10	TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye.
11	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis.
12	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye.
13	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden.
14	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: No.
15	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius.
16	TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye.
17	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla.
18	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Present.
19	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson.
20	PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye.
21	Gina.
22	MS. TUCZAK: The next item on the agenda
23	is with respect to the contract for Tim Walsh.
24	What was done here was a revision. We
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1 had a two-year contract with Mr. Walsh & 2 Associates. We would be in the second year of the 3 contract. However, with the elimination of the 4 in-person voting, the contract needed to be 5 changed. So the recommendation from fiduciary 6 counsel was to just draft a new contract rather 7 than try to amend something. What we worked on with fiduciary counsel 8 9 is a new contract with Mr. Walsh. However, what we 10 prepared was based on the July 9th board meeting, which was a two-step process. So what we prepared 11 here needs to be revised to reflect the motion from 12 13 earlier today. 14 MS. BURNS: Given the time, Gina, does 15 the Board need to take action on this matter today 16 or can they do that at their September meeting? 17 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: My experience has 18 always been a two-step. In other words, Gina would 19 come in and say I want authorization from you 20 people to enter into a contract with this guy. And then that contract would come back after it is 21 22 reduced to writing and approved as to form by the 23 outside counsel. And the contract should naturally 24 reflect the scope of what the intent was that the

1 trustees are operating under. 2 So I think we can give authorization to 3 enter into a contract with Walsh & Associates but Gina doesn't execute it on our behalf until it 4 5 comes back and is approved, that is pretty clean. 6 Can people live with that? 7 A question to Mr. Walsh would MS. BURNS: be whether Mr. Walsh could continue to work on good 8 9 faith knowing that we just have to finalize the 10 contract in September. MR. WALSH: We are prepared to move 11 forward in good faith, based upon my understanding 12 of what this new all mail in will be. 13 As soon as we clarified that aspect, just what we talked about 14 15 earlier, processing on a daily basis and how we are 16 conducting the day of, those are the only unknowns. 17 But otherwise, we certainly will move forward with 18 the steps to meet the timelines for petitions and 19 everything else before that contract is ready. 20 MS. BURNS: That is great. We will 21 continue to operate under the old contract and we will come back with the revised contract. 22 23 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Based on the one-step 24 mailer, it sounds like to me we would have a cost

1	savings from not having the application sent out,
2	processed, picked up at the post office, that
3	beginning part, is probably not a very high dollar
4	amount of savings but I think is that the end
5	result of it?
6	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I wouldn't assume
7	anything until the people get in this room and see
8	what is what.
9	TRUSTEE HUGHES: This is Trustee Hughes.
10	The hurdle rates might change and the per ballot
11	cost might change based upon the office's new plan.
12	Gina can work with Mr. Walsh to come back after
13	negotiations.
14	MR. WALSH: Yes, that is true. As long
15	as we can work through the details of how that is
16	flowing through it. But, yes, that hurdle is
17	eliminated by all ballots being mailed on the front
18	end. We will put that together.
19	PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. In the meantime
20	there was a draft, so, Trustees, if you have
21	comments, please give those to Gina. If you have
22	any feedback on what you have now, even though it
23	is going to be changed.
24	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Was that a motion that
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1 I did? Can we have a motion to direct the 2 Executive Director to negotiate a contract with 3 Walsh & Associates and before it comes back into us have it signed off as to form by the outside 4 5 counsel with the anticipation that we accept it and execute it -- that it is executed after it is 6 7 presented back to us, that is the motion. 8 PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there a second? 9 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I will second it. 10 PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there any 11 discussion? 12 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: For clarification, had 13 Covid not happened, Mr. Walsh's contract would 14 expire in 2021? 15 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 16 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Is it over after the 17 next election? 18 MS. TUCZAK: After this election, 2021. 19 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Okay. I just 20 wondered. 21 PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. Roll call, 22 please, Peggy. 23 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair. 24 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye. DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode. 2 TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye. 3 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. TRUSTEE HUGHES: 4 Aye. 5 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 6 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 7 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: 8 Aye. 9 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. 10 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. 11 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. 12 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. 13 Trustee Wilson. MS. FAHRENBACH: 14 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. Thank you, very much. 15 16 Again, Gina, Election Rules. 17 MS. TUCZAK: The next item, again this is 18 based on the July 9th board meeting, we had taken the Election Rules and we had marked up the changes 19 20 from the most recent version approved by the Board 21 to reflect the elimination of the in-person voting 22 and also to reflect the motion from the July 23 meeting to have an Election Committee. Given what has happened today, with the 24 DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE

1 two rescinded motions and changes, this draft that 2 we provided for you does not reflect those new 3 motions so we would have to make some revisions to this. 4 5 One comment I would like to make, and 6 this is really reflective of what Trustee Blair had 7 said, was that if we were to have the full packet available to people picking up their petitions that 8 9 would mean that the Board approved rules would need 10 to be ready on August 20th. 11 So if we make the changes to the rules as has been approved by the Board, with the motions 12 13 that were approved, then the September 3rd meeting 14 would be after the beginning of that date so I just 15 want to make sure that I laid that out. TRUSTEE GOODE: I make a motion that we 16 17 accept the Rules with today's motions and changes 18 and that those changes would be sent out by email to us for review. 19 20 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Does that motion 21 require to share with us for review or share it 22 with us because you are not going to have an 23 opportunity to approve it? 24 TRUSTEE GOODE: I am trying to make it DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 easy. 2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I don't think there is 3 an easy way. TRUSTEE GOODE: Changes with the comments 4 5 and prepare for people to come pickup their packets to make it easier. 6 7 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Personally, if I was them, I would feel okay if you charge Gina with the 8 9 responsibility of incorporating these changes with the assistance of the outside counsel. 10 11 Otherwise, you are disturbing the document with emails back and forth. 12 If you are 13 going to prepare a document, one person has to be 14 responsible for it. This might sound like a good 15 idea but this person already anticipated it so you 16 shouldn't disturb it because you are going to foul 17 it up, that is my experience. 18 TRUSTEE HUGHES: This is Trustee Hughes. 19 Could the changes be reviewed by the subcommittee 20 that was just appointed and approved by the 21 subcommittee? Would that be acceptable by the other board members? 22 23 TRUSTEE GOODE: As long as there are no 24 substantial changes.

1	
1	TRUSTEE HUGHES: The changes we approved
2	today.
3	MS. TUCZAK: There are changes in Trustee
4	McFadden's comments earlier on the scope of what
5	the IDA did. There are reassignment of many IDA's
6	responsibilities.
7	I know on the original rules when we did
8	a search on Independent Election Administrator, we
9	got quite a few hits.
10	So there are some things in here that
11	have been assigned to what was the Election
12	Committee so there are some significant things.
13	That being said, Trustee Hughes, as you
14	recommend, the subcommittee review might be a good
15	one after staff has worked with fiduciary counsel
16	to reflect all the references to correct the rules,
17	based on the motions made today. I do think it is
18	a valuable step that there be some input from the
19	subcommittee, the ad hoc committee, on these
20	changes because this is fairly significant.
21	PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay.
22	TRUSTEE GOODE: I withdraw my motion.
23	MS. BURNS: If I may, the motion would be
24	to direct the process of revising the Election
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1	Rules for the October, 2020 election to staff and
2	fiduciary counsel with approval of the Election
3	Committee so that the rules can be included in the
4	packet picked up by potential candidates for
5	office.
6	TRUSTEE BLAIR: I will move that.
7	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I will second.
8	PRESIDENT WILSON: Moved and seconded.
9	Does anyone need to hear that again?
10	Roll call, please.
11	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair.
12	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye.
13	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode.
14	TRUSTEE GOODE: No.
15	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes.
16	TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye.
17	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis.
18	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye.
19	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden.
20	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye.
21	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius.
22	TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye.
23	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla.
24	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Present.
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1 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 2 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 3 Thank you. Gina, anything else on election that you 4 5 want to share with us at this point? 6 MS. TUCZAK: That is it from my 7 Thank you. perspective. PRESIDENT WILSON: 8 Okay. Let us go on to 9 the benefit matter. Gina. 10 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. Behind Tab 4, there's a very brief memo about a member that was discussed 11 12 at the last board meeting. 13 This member had applied for retirement 14 and as you may recall that the member had over 29 15 years of service. The member wanted to utilize the 16 deferred compensation to purchase some sick time, 17 that would make that service credit over 30 years. 18 The Board discussed a few issues with this. The Board also requested that Fund staff go back to 19 20 Nationwide and determine a few things on timing and 21 the nature of the item that took ten days for the 22 member to respond to. We did that and then that is 23 documented in here. 24 I will let you know that yesterday I got

1 a letter from a Mr. Marconi, who is an attorney, 2 and he actually wrote a letter to me sent via email 3 and he indicated that they, Mr. Marconi and the 4 member, are working to see if there is some success 5 to move the member's separation date to May 9th, 6 which would then qualify the payment that was 7 received to be within 30 days. So I wanted to let the Board know that we 8 9 had done what was requested. This letter came in 10 yesterday and I have talked to fiduciary counsel. 11 Given that there is some possibility that they are working on the separation date, perhaps the matter 12 13 should be deferred rather than making a final 14 decision. If the Board makes a final decision 15 today, then this member would only have 35 days 16 from the date that the award letter is sent to file 17 anything in Administrative Review and work through 18 the legal system to challenge the benefit. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I move that it be 19 20 deferred. 21 MS. BURNS: As to Trustee McFadden's 22 motion, it is deferred at the request of an 23 attorney who has identified himself as acting on 24 behalf of the member.

1 TRUSTEE GOODE: The attorney is asking us 2 to defer? 3 MS. BURNS: He didn't use those words, ma'am. What he did was he said that he wanted to 4 5 have some time to be able to see if he can change 6 this member's retirement date. My guess is this 7 will be back to you in September. TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I will second it. 8 9 PRESIDENT WILSON: Any discussion? 10 TRUSTEE BLAIR: I was out of the room. 11 Is this in regard to --12 MS. BURNS: Member 141197. 13 PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. All in favor 14 say "Aye". 15 (Chorus of ayes.) 16 PRESIDENT WILSON: Any opposed say "Nay". 17 (No nays.) 18 PRESIDENT WILSON: This matter is deferred. Thank you, very much. 19 Finance matters. Gina. 20 21 MS. TUCZAK: At the end of our audits of 22 the Financial Statements of the Cook County Fund 23 and the Forest Preserve Fund, the auditor has 24 traditionally prepared some reporting that goes to DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1 the employer. 2 The reporting, and I don't want to bore 3 everybody with the accounting terms, there is some 4 government accounting standards that require the 5 employer to put some of the liabilities associated 6 with the pension and healthcare obligations on the 7 employer's Financial Statements. 8 So the auditors, Legacy, our auditors, 9 prepared some reporting and that is provided to the 10 County and the Forest Preserve to assist them in 11 their financial reporting matters that they must 12 complete. 13 So there are four reports. There is one 14 for the Cook County pension obligations. There is 15 one for the Cook County healthcare obligations. 16 There is one for the Forest Preserve pension 17 obligations and one for the Forest Preserve 18 healthcare obligations. The opinion letters are addressed to the 19 Board of Trustees. The numbers in here either tie 20 21 out to the actuary reports that we received or 22 analysis that has been done by Legacy which is 23 consistent with prior analysis and ultimately ties 24 out to the numbers.

1 This is for your information and again 2 since these are addressed to the Board of Trustees 3 this is a receive and file type of matter. PRESIDENT WILSON: So we don't need to go 4 5 through these. We have talked about many of these 6 before. Carry on. 7 MS. TUCZAK: If the Board is desirous of 8 such a motion to receive and file so that they can 9 be issued. 10 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I make the motion. 11 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Second. 12 MS. BURNS: Motion by McFadden. Seconded by Blair. 13 14 PRESIDENT WILSON: All in favor please 15 say "aye". 16 (Chorus of ayes.) 17 PRESIDENT WILSON: Any opposed? 18 (No nays.) 19 PRESIDENT WILSON: The reports are 20 received. 21 MS. TUCZAK: Thank you. 22 The next item on the agenda is the bound 23 Financial Statements and the bound actuary reports. 24 You may recall from the June meeting, DEBBIE TYRRELL REPORTING SERVICE (630) 292-1742

1	which I know was a long one, the audio conference,
2	I had a request I know Trustee Nevius asked if
3	we were going to get bound copies so we have those
4	for you and they are on the back ledge there. The
5	Financial Statements for Cook County and the Forest
6	Preserve and various actuary reports.
7	Help yourselves to them. I wanted to
8	make sure that you know they are available for you
9	now.
10	PRESIDENT WILSON: Thank you.
11	The Administrative Matters. Stimulus.
12	MS. TUCZAK: Thank you. I will start and
13	then I am going to turn it over to Burke, Burns and
14	Pinelli.
15	There has been some interest from some of
16	the Trustees whether or not the Fund would qualify
17	to apply for some Federal stimulus funds under the
18	Payroll Protection Program.
19	I had requested that fiduciary counsel
20	assist with this evaluation and they have done a
21	lot of hard work on this matter and I wanted to
22	turn that over to them so they can discuss all
23	their efforts to assist with this process.
24	MS. BOECKMAN: Thank you, Gina.
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1 As Gina mentioned, Gina reached out to us 2 last week to review whether or not the Fund was 3 eligible to receive a loan under the PPP program. We reviewed the CARES Act. We reviewed 4 5 interim rules filed with the Federal Register by the SBA. We also contacted the SBA on numerous 6 7 occasions. We unfortunately were unable to get anyone there to provide a definitive answer. 8 9 But what we did, we reviewed everything that the SBA has promulgated relating to this 10 program and we made a good faith determination the 11 Fund could qualify or could be eligible for this 12 13 PPP loan. 14 Again, it is a "good faith determination" 15 and there are various factors that they ask you to 16 look at. 17 There are also factors on the other side 18 as to why we would not potentially qualify for this 19 loan program. 20 Yesterday, we had a phone call with 21 Wintrust, which is the lender that the Fund 22 identified that we would go through to apply for 23 this loan. We spoke with counsel for Wintrust who 24 has concerns about our eligibility to apply for the

1	loan. He understood our determination and he
2	recognized and admitted on the phone that it was a
3	good faith basis and we had a good faith
4	determination for proceeding. But Wintrust was
5	uncomfortable frankly due to the fact that they
6	thought there was potentially too much of control
7	from a government entity and government entities
8	are prohibited for applying for this loan. And
9	then they also had a concern you have to make a
10	representation that the Fund would be unable to
11	continue its operations without the support of this
12	loan. And Wintrust had a concern about whether or
13	not the Fund would be able to meet that standard.
14	Again, they agreed that the Fund had a
15	good faith basis, a good faith determination, but
16	they were unwilling at the end of the day to
17	process the loan for the Fund.
18	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Do other pension
19	funds do you know if they qualified and received
20	funding?
21	MS. BOECKMAN: Good question. So we
22	looked into that. There are other defined benefit
23	pension funds who have received funding under this
24	program, no public plans, however. That is

1 something that Wintrust noted in our phone call 2 yesterday. They recognize there were these other 3 plans that are frequently associated with church 4 organizations. So we were able to find a couple of 5 those that did get loans. 6 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Did we make application 7 for this? MS. BOECKMAN: We did not, no. 8 That was 9 on the agenda today. MS. BURNS: What the law allows and the 10 way the program is setup is for small businesses 11 with less than 500 employees or tax exempt 12 13 organizations. 14 Those tax exempt organizations can be 15 501(c)3, veterans organizations, I think a tribal 16 council or tribal organization, or "any other" tax 17 exempt organization. 18 We kind of fit within that "any other" business exemption. We thought maybe we could fit 19 into that bucket but the bank was uncomfortable 20 21 because we have a governmental connection that is 22 stronger than the Catholic churches connections or 23 any churches connection to a governmental body. 24 We are at the point where we tried to

1	obtain the loan. You, as fiduciaries, as you know
2	have to try to secure funding, and you and your
3	staff certainly have tried. Your staff did
4	everything they could. Caroline worked very hard.
5	The Executive Director got the application ready.
6	They provided all the information to the bank.
7	They had us look at it as lawyers to give you
8	comfort.
9	Ultimately, Wintrust, which is very
10	active in this market, looked at it and said we
11	won't process your application.
12	There is not much more the Fund can do.
13	The deadline I believe is August 8th so we just
14	wanted to report back to you we are putting a memo
15	into the Fund's files that outlines everything we
16	did, the basis of our good faith determination at
17	staff's direction to look into this, and that
18	ultimately the bank made the decision not to
19	process the application.
20	Unless you had questions, we just wanted
21	to update you on this matter. We didn't learn from
22	the bank until last night at $7:30$ or so, and that
23	is why the matter is still on the agenda. Gina
24	wanted to be prepared to file if the bank would be

1	willing to process the application.
2	I don't know how much we were looking
3	for. Maybe about half a million.
4	MS. TUCZAK: Based on the calculations
5	573 thousand.
6	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: If one of our members
7	approached me on the street and says, you know, I
8	see that the Catholic church got 5 million. What
9	are you guys doing? I will tell them that we have
10	investigated it and it wasn't going to workout.
11	MS. BURNS: Yes, sir.
12	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Otherwise you would be
13	accused of leaving \$500,000 on the table, without
14	even entertaining whether or not you are entitled
15	to it.
16	MS. BURNS: We did get it in writing from
17	the bank that they would not process our
18	application. The banker was kind enough to put
19	that in writing. To Trustee McFadden's point, you
20	are well-documented.
21	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Is there another bank
22	that could process it?
23	MS. TUCZAK: I had reached out to another
24	one of our banks Amalgamated. They had indicated,
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1 this was awhile back, because we're not a 501(c)3 2 -- they asked are we a 501(c)3 and we are not. 3 Wintrust I had heard good things in terms of their processing of these. Certainly their 4 5 support of Chicago enterprises. They were not the only ones. I also reached out to your custodian, 6 7 BNY Mellon, and they said we don't process these. PRESIDENT WILSON: 8 Okay. Any other 9 discussion? 10 Thank you for the efforts and attempt. 11 Carry on. 12 MS. TUCZAK: On to 6.B, this is a contract matter. 13 14 As you may recall at the May meeting, I 15 talked to the Trustees about the disaster recovery 16 services and managed backup that has been provided 17 with an agreement with CDW-G. I had indicated at 18 the time that they have a business partner, All 19 Information Services, that really does all the 20 work, that they basically outsource to AIS. 21 I had asked for approval for a one year 22 renewal of the arrangement. The Board did provide 23 that. As we were finalizing all of the 24 information, it became clear to us that CDW-G is

1 not interested in being involved in the arrangement 2 anymore and they have indicated that AIS, All 3 Information Services, should just negotiate this 4 directly with us. 5 I wanted to report that back to you because the motion at the time was to allow this 6 7 extension agreement with CDW-G and now I know that 8 that's not possible. The agreement needs to be 9 with AIS. AIS has been providing these services 10 through May and they continue to do so. The fees 11 are identical to what was already discussed. Fiduciary counsel has been looking at the 12 arrangement but I just wanted to get the approval 13 14 to have this agreement done with AIS. 15 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Has AIS executed an 16 offer for you? 17 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 18 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Move approval. 19 MS. TUCZAK: They have provided an offer. 20 They haven't signed it. 21 MS. BURNS: I have a few comments I want 22 They have given Gina a Change Order but to make. 23 they reference some block billing concept that I 24 don't like for public pension funds so I am going

1	to suggest we reword that provision. Same result
2	but I don't like the idea that they could charge
3	you a hour and 50 when they only work a hour.
4	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Having been in the
5	procurement business, when I said a few minutes ago
6	the two-step where the Board would authorize Gina
7	to enter in an arrangement with Walsh, and then
8	bring us back what essentially is their written
9	offer signed and sealed, the only thing left to do
10	is for us to accept it. That gets rid of the
11	hiccups of someone between now and then saying, gee
12	whiz, I am not going to agree to this.
13	Now in this case, it is kind of two-step.
14	She is changing horses but still isn't finished
15	with it until they come to some agreement, which
16	possibly could never happen.
17	So I would think you would want to come
18	back to us and say I want authorization to execute
19	this contract on behalf of the Fund. That is
20	another level of bureaucracy, but we have gotten
21	stuck in between on occasions and it certainly
22	hurts your ability to negotiate with someone. So
23	that is for what it is worth.
24	PRESIDENT WILSON: Are you looking for an
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1	action? You need to negotiate more based on input
2	from fiduciary counsel? What would you like at
3	this point?
4	MS. TUCZAK: What I originally wanted was
5	the Board's approval to go ahead and complete this
6	arrangement subject to fiduciary counsel's review
7	and sign-off but if the Board would prefer that
8	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Stop. Are you okay
9	with that?
10	MS. BURNS: I'm okay with this action
11	because the term is set, the price is set, and the
12	scope of services are set so I think this Board can
13	approve it consistent with its fiduciary duties.
14	We are advising you that there are some
15	non-substantive language problems.
16	What Gina wants is a motion authorizing
17	the Fund to engage AIS to perform these services
18	from May 4, 2020 to May 4, 2021, for a one-year
19	term in other words, at a monthly cost not to
20	exceed \$3,095 per month, subject to such further
21	changes non-substantive that I make to the
22	document.
23	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The dollar amounts
24	are the same to what we were paying before, am I
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1	correct?
2	MS. BURNS: Yes.
3	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Move approval.
4	TRUSTEE GOODE: I will second it.
5	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: When she came into us
6	in May or June, she wanted to extend the contract
7	with CDW and then the paperwork turns up and CDW
8	doesn't want any longer to have us funnel in the
9	money to them to go to this service so that kind of
10	throws everything out of whack.
11	PRESIDENT WILSON: Roll call, please.
12	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair.
13	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye.
14	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Goode.
15	TRUSTEE GOODE: Aye.
16	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes.
17	TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye.
18	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis.
19	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye.
20	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden.
21	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye.
22	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius.
23	TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye.
24	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla.
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1 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. 2 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 3 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 4 Thank you. 5 Executive Director's Report. 6 MS. TUCZAK: A couple of things on this. 7 With respect to the Covid situation, we continue to operate as articulated at the July meeting with 8 9 staff divided into three groups. With one group 10 being in the office and two groups staying remote 11 and then the rotation the next week with a new 12 group coming in and two groups remote. We continue 13 to have about five management employees, including 14 myself, that are here every day every week. That 15 has worked well, I would like to continue that 16 until Labor Day. 17 If it is safe to do so and if there is an 18 increase in member requests, what I am considering 19 would be to go to two groups. Where you have half 20 on, half off. 21 I think we can continue this plan until 22 Labor Day, which would take me to the next board 23 meeting. If circumstances change and there is a 24 need to have more staff present to handle increased

1	
1	volume, then I would change it to two groups, which
2	is what I am looking to do after Labor Day but if
3	necessary we would have that occur earlier.
4	PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay.
5	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I have a question.
6	The in-person, obviously, you don't have people
7	coming in on a regular basis to meet the staff.
8	MS. TUCZAK: That's correct.
9	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Did you have staff
10	dedicated just for that purpose prior to Covid?
11	If you did, what are they doing today?
12	MS. TUCZAK: We did not have staff whose
13	only job was to meet with members. They had other
14	responsibilities associated with processing their
15	request.
16	The member communication does continue
17	via phone where members call in and the staff
18	whether they are in the office or remote calls the
19	member back and continues that communication in
20	that manner.
21	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Thank you.
22	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I have heard a lot of
23	the people say don't plan on coming back to work
24	until January. Another firm that said don't plan
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1	on coming back to work until there is a vaccine.
2	So, obviously, on your way home, these
3	kind of things occur to you and you don't want to
4	have them come back here until something feels
5	right.
6	MS. TUCZAK: Yes. I certainly want to
7	insure the safety of the staff, which is why I
8	adopted this program. But because so many of our
9	procedures, and frankly the member preference,
10	still require documents that are being mailed in,
11	faxed in. It is amazing how many FedEx packages we
12	get. It is critical that there be some staff at
13	the office to receive these documents and process
14	them in an expeditious manner.
15	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: There is like two
16	coffee rooms like up there it seems like. Could
17	you dedicate a room to some kind of an infrared
18	blue light to do the mail on its way in, that is
19	just off the top of my head. But I think like
20	planes are doing and that is a thought. Sorry.
21	MS. TUCZAK: I'd have to see what that
22	would entail.
23	It's also very helpful to actually be
24	able to call members back from the phone in the
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1 office where they see the Cook County number. 2 We do have some staff, mostly the 3 directors, that have Fund issued cellphones but 4 those numbers aren't recognized so there is a 5 benefit to having staff in the office returning calls. 6 7 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I don't know if this is under new business. I will bring it up now. 8 We 9 had in the past at this time of the year started 10 holding sessions about when to retire. We had 11 conferences on that where staff was available 12 in-person. Could we look at possibly doing that 13 remotely through virtual seminars? 14 MS. TUCZAK: I can look into that. Ι 15 think the concern with that is that somebody who is 16 really considering needs to actually call and we 17 can walk through very specifically with a counselor 18 how many years of service you have, what are you looking at in terms of this date or this date. 19 20 Having a virtual platform people are kind of tuned 21 in but not really tuned in and not paying attention 22 like they should be. 23 But I can look into that. It's just the 24 regulation of that and the information that is

1	said, how it is presented once it is recorded and
2	available. You have to be careful with that. All
3	that would have to be considered.
4	Should I continue?
5	PRESIDENT WILSON: Yes, please.
6	MS. TUCZAK: This is just to report the
7	25 million from Cook County for July was received
8	on time, which is great.
9	The next item is the Pension Committee of
10	the Cook Pension Fund and the Forest Preserve
11	Pension Fund, that meeting with the Cook County
12	Commissioners was held last Tuesday, July 28th.
13	The 2019 financial results were presented to the
14	Committee, which now includes not just Cook, but
15	also Forest.
16	The meeting was conducted virtually so I
17	was on Teams and all the commissioners were on like
18	that. There were a couple of questions from
19	Commissioner Gainor and a few other commissioners
20	with respect to alternative plans for the
21	investment portfolio, requests of the details of
22	the private equity portfolio, breakdown of the
23	minority ownership of some of the managers and then
24	some requests on further revisions to the

1 investment results. 2 Callan is working on a responsive memo or 3 letter that we were going to provide at the August Investment Committee meeting for that committee to 4 5 take a look at the proposed responses. 6 PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. Keep going. 7 MS. TUCZAK: I just wanted to thank --8 there were a couple of trustees that were available 9 and willing to be on this. Trustee Blair was on 10 that call and Trustee Kouruklis was listening in and Trustee Wilson was as well and I just 11 12 appreciated that support. 13 I thought you did a TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: 14 good job. I thought some of the questions that 15 came through were somewhat repetitive and it is a 16 learning process I think for everyone because 17 everybody just wants to know the facts. 18 You can't put everything into one document and I understand that. 19 But from that 20 group, which seems to be obviously more engaged in 21 knowing how this Fund works, the budgetary items 22 surrounding our Fund, the revenue that comes in, I 23 should say really goes out, payments that go out, 24 our investment side. I would like to have a report

1 that encompasses a lot of what was discussed at the 2 last meeting with the County's Pension Committee 3 and make it a standard report. I don't know if you can do it quarterly. This way anyone who meets 4 5 with the Pension Fund or with you doesn't have to go through the process of learning what our 6 7 investment return was last year or what is our plan for the next ten years or are we in for the long 8 9 haul or what is Callan doing. 10 Some of the highlights that we kind of go over and some of the highlights we have available 11 to us in putting together a report, especially for 12 13 the County. 14 I think you're doing a great job, I 15 really do. I know a lot of people here feel the 16 same way. You have a great staff to support you 17 and, of course, our consultants that help us. 18 We have so much available at our 19 fingertips in putting all this together. I know it would be difficult the first time but once you have 20 it then it would be just updating and updating. 21 I take this from a lot of what we do at 22 23 the Treasurer's office. I think I bring this up a 24 lot on different matters. We have what is called a

1	State of the Office Report. It is really a
2	standard report we do every year available on the
3	website. We also provide hard copies to all
4	commissioners. We promote that a lot. We update
5	that a lot. I know we do a yearly report but
6	because we have
7	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Can you share one of
8	those with us?
9	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Absolutely. I will
10	bring it.
11	When Gina first started here, we sat
12	through the report itself. I was trying to provide
13	some recommendations as to how to present things.
14	And, again, I thought the questions were
15	great and important that you were getting. I think
16	you were prepared for most of them but I would like
17	to be as a whole even more prepared with the
18	answers immediately especially when it comes to the
19	investment side. And I know you called on Fernando
20	once, which was helpful, but that is it. The
21	document really helps support that. It is a
22	quarterly report that happens, if the Fund agrees.
23	I am not trying to put more work on the group but
24	once you do it it's just the updating. Thank you.

1 PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay. 2 TRUSTEE HUGHES: This is Trustee Hughes. 3 I wanted to mention I also listened in on the call. 4 I thought Gina did a great job. I had to get off 5 at one o'clock because I had a conflict at that 6 time. 7 I just wanted to mention that the Forest 8 Preserve did have a member of our advisory council 9 also address the Pension Committee pointing out 10 that the Forest Preserve does not currently 11 participate in the IGA that the County has with the Pension Fund and requesting financial assistance 12 13 from the County. I am not sure how well that went over to 14 15 the Commissioners but we did have one of our 16 advocates address the Board at that meeting. Ι 17 thought it important I mention this with the 18 Trustees here. 19 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Trustee Hughes, that 20 is a good point. That is another item that I think 21 not all County Commissioners knew that we had 22 legislation that included the Forest Preserve and 23 there are actions being taken to try to get things 24 improved. And, obviously, this group feels

1	strongly about that issue and whenever there are
2	questions it is nice to see in a report the actions
3	that we are and have taken and continue to take to
4	fund the Fund and improve technology and report on
5	your investments, et cetera.
6	MS. TUCZAK: Thank you, Trustee Hughes, I
7	neglected to mention him as another trustee on the
8	call. I appreciate his support. Thank you to all
9	of you.
10	The next item is with respect to Mr.
11	Rizki's presentation to the Pension Fund. As we
12	talked about in the July meeting, Mr. Rizki sent a
13	letter to the Board in March. He asked to attend a
14	board meeting and present some information and
15	introduce himself to the Trustees. The Board
16	agreed to do that.
17	Then the pandemic hit and all the
18	meetings were audio, with essential matters only.
19	Now that we are back in person, the Board offered
20	an invitation to him to come to this meeting and I
21	extended that to him. He again came back to me and
22	he was working on some revenue information and he
23	needed a little bit more time. He didn't want to
24	come here and not have a complete presentation and

1	then have to come back. He asked if he could
2	attend the September meeting and make his
3	introduction and presentation.
4	PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay.
5	MS. TUCZAK: The next item on my report
6	is just that we have two committee meetings this
7	month. We have a Health Benefits Committee meeting
8	on August 18th and then we have an Investment
9	Committee meeting on August 26th.
10	The meetings are not on the same day.
11	They are both scheduled to be potentially longer
12	meetings. The Health Benefits Committee will be
13	setting rates for next year and the Investment
14	Committee will have a significant component of the
15	meeting being the interviews of the finalists for
16	the investment consultants. So I wanted to get
17	that on your calendars and let you know that.

21	executive session, if that is okay.
