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1 2 PRESIDENT WILSON: I will now call the 3 meeting to order. I hereby convene this meeting of the Cook 4 5 County and Forest Preserve District Annuity and Benefit Fund Board of Trustees for May 6, 2021. 6 7 Because of the uncertainty surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic, the Board is adhering to the 8 9 guidance provided most recently by the Governor's 10 April 30, 2021 Disaster Proclamation, the Governor's Executive Order Number 2021-9, as well 11 as the provisions of Public Act 101-0640. 12 There 13 may not be a quorum of trustees physically present 14 at the meeting location. Some trustees, however, 15 are present at the public meeting location, as is 16 the Executive Director and Fund Counsel. The 17 remaining trustees will participate by video 18 conference as allowed by the Governor's Executive Orders. 19 For the record, the public has received 20 21 notice of this public meeting and of their ability 22 to participate by videoconference or to be 23 physically present at the meeting. In addition, 24 the Fund is recording this meeting and a transcript

1 within its jurisdiction. 2 Are there any requests for public comment 3 today? If any member of the public wants to speak, please identify yourself for the record. 4 5 Hearing none, we will proceed with the 6 public business matters. 7 First item is Review and Approval of 8 Minutes and transcript for the April 1, 2021 board 9 meeting minutes and the April 1, 2021 transcript of 10 board meeting. 11 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Move approval of both, please. 12 13 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Second. 14 PRESIDENT WILSON: It's been moved by 15 Trustee McFadden and seconded by Trustee Blair. 16 Any discussion? 17 Peggy, please call the roll. 18 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair. TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye. 19 20 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. 21 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 22 23 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 24 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden.

1 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye. 2 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. 3 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. 4 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. 5 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee O'Rourke. 6 7 TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Aye. 8 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 9 PRESIDENT WILSON: I will vote present because I wasn't here. 10 The next item is the Review and 11 Consideration of Bills, Payroll Records. 12 13 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Move approval. 14 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I will second. 15 PRESIDENT WILSON: I would also like that 16 motion to include those that have already been paid 17 and those presented for payment, based on the 18 Fund's staff's confirmation, that said staff 19 payments are consistent with the 2021 20 Administrative Budget. So Bills, Payroll Records 21 at this time. 22 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Yes, that was the 23 thought to include all those things. 24 PRESIDENT WILSON: Trustee Ochalla is the

1 second. 2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I have a couple of 3 questions, should I ask them now? PRESIDENT WILSON: Yes, please. 4 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: At the top there is an 5 AED, I think I knew what that refers to but I 6 7 forget what it is. 8 MS. TUCZAK: That is an electronic defibrillator I believe. It is a machine that we 9 have at our office. 10 11 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: So the \$400 is an annual maintenance? 12 13 MS. TUCZAK: It is a subscription for 14 service. 15 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: And the \$220 is the --16 MS. TUCZAK: We are buying batteries and 17 pads. 18 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Once a year? 19 MS. TUCZAK: We haven't bought batteries 20 and pads since I have been here. I think this is 21 something we do every few years and this 22 subscription is a three-year subscription. 23 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: The 400 is for three 24 years?

1 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. 2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Then I think that 3 should be there. It is not an annual, it is a 4 three-year fee. 5 The next one is the Chicago Office 6 Technology Group. These bills go back to October. 7 May I ask are they slow in billing or are they 8 sitting on -- or was there a question or were the 9 bills sitting someplace? 10 MS. TUCZAK: There was a question that we 11 had and our sales rep changed and we were having a 12 hard time getting a response. 13 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Good. 14 The Illinois Department of Insurance gets 15 \$8,000 from both the County Fund and the Forest 16 Preserve Fund. We have always had this? 17 MS. TUCZAK: I believe so. 18 MS. BURNS: Other public pension funds are charged similarly for the Department of 19 Insurance to do some sort of compliance audit, I 20 don't think they do it, but that is what the fee is 21 for, by statute. 22 23 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Similarly, does 24 someone else get charged more or less?

1 MS. TUCZAK: I think it is the same. 2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: When you have a 3 chance, when you see that paragraph, could you read it and --4 5 MS. BURNS: Yes, sir. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: The last one I think I 6 7 had is Hartford for business owner's insurance 8 premium. There is no period of time there. Is that an annual? 9 10 MS. TUCZAK: That is annual. My 11 apologies, that is annual. 12 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: But it would helpful 13 if we were a little more conscious of the period of 14 time. 15 MS. TUCZAK: Sure. 16 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: That is all I had, thank you. 17 18 PRESIDENT WILSON: Any other questions on the motion? 19 20 TRUSTEE HUGHES: I have a question for 21 Gina. Gina, it looks like you are significantly 22 under actuals versus budgeted expense for the year. 23 I was wondering if you could provide some 24 background on that. Expenses are much lower --

1	your actual are much on Page 2 of 2 of your
2	budget to actuals.
3	MS. TUCZAK: I think a significant reason
4	for that is the Pension Administration System. So
5	we did put in a sizable budget to consider
6	implementing that at the back end of the year, but
7	the way that the mechanics work on the budget to
8	actual reporting is it takes the budget and divides
9	it by 12 and then multiplies it by the number of
10	months.
11	So if you prorate that, we haven't
12	incurred any expenses for that or for the IT
13	personnel that I was going to hire, that is a
14	significant portion of it.
15	TRUSTEE HUGHES: Okay, thank you.
16	PRESIDENT WILSON: Any other questions on
17	the motion?
18	Peggy, please call the roll.

FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 10 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 11 The Bills and Payroll Records have been 12 approved. 13 May I have motion to approve all 14 Annuities, Spouse and Child Annuities, and Refunds? 15 TRUSTEE BLAIR: So moved. 16 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Second. 17 PRESIDENT WILSON: It has been moved by 18 Trustee Blair and seconded by Trustee McFadden. 19 Any questions? 20 Peggy, please call the roll. 21 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair. 22 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye. 23 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye. 24

1 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 2 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 3 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: 4 Aye. 5 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. 6 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. 7 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. 8 9 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee O'Rourke. 10 TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Aye. 11 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 12 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. 13 Thank you. The Annuities, Spouse and 14 Child Annuities, and Refunds have been approved. 15 May I have a motion to approve all 16 Ordinary and Duty Disabilities? 17 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: So moved. 18 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Second. PRESIDENT WILSON: It's been moved by 19 Trustee McFadden and seconded by Trustee Blair. 20 Any discussion on the motion? 21 22 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Just a thought, Gary 23 gets these? The thought was simply if -- and I 24 don't want to upset the routine if it has an impact

1 on it but if these were grouped by department --2 MS. TUCZAK: I can find out. This is 3 disability department. TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Would you ask? 4 5 MS. TUCZAK: Right now it is coming out alphabetical so we would have to do some 6 7 reprogramming but I can see how easy that is. 8 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Yes. 9 MS. TUCZAK: Okay. 10 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Just a thought. If 11 someone says, well, no, that's not a good idea then I am --12 13 PRESIDENT WILSON: What was the request, 14 I'm sorry? 15 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: That I was thinking 16 when I was going through them, well, to group them 17 by department. In other words, the hospital or 18 which hospital and such. 19 MS. TUCZAK: Okay. 20 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I remember years ago 21 thinking that a department might get into a routine 22 where these things all of a sudden start coming up 23 where there weren't any before. 24 PRESIDENT WILSON: Okay, thank you. Any

1 other questions on the motion? 2 Roll call, please. 3 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair. TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye. 4 5 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. 6 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye. 7 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. 8 9 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. 10 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye. 11 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius. TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. 12 13 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. 14 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. 15 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee O'Rourke. 16 TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Aye. 17 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 18 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. The Ordinary and Duty Disabilities have 19 20 been approved. 21 On legislative matters, Madam Executive 22 Director, I will turn this over to you. I note 23 that our legislative consultants John McCabe and 24 Derek Blaida are present. Gina, please start the

1	discussion.
2	MS. TUCZAK: Thank you. So we have in
3	front of ourselves here a memo that was written by
4	Mr. McCabe regarding his legislative report that he
5	typically provides while the General Assembly is in
6	session.
7	There isn't any significant matter to
8	note. Our bills that we originally filed with
9	respect to the Forest Preserve source of funds and
10	the disability language, those have been compiled
11	into a I will call it a noncontroversial bill
12	package. But if you would like, Mr. McCabe can
13	discuss the other parts of our bill.
14	With respect to yesterday, I don't know
15	if you would like me to move onto that topic or if
16	there is any other questions or discussions on Mr.
17	McCabe's memo or General Assembly activity.
18	PRESIDENT WILSON: Hearing none, move
19	on to yesterday's proceedings.
20	MS. TUCZAK: So yesterday we had a
21	virtual meeting with Senator Martwick and we also
22	had present from our side Trustee Ochalla, Trustee
23	Kouruklis, Mary Pat, myself and two staff that were
24	there representing the Pension Fund. Cook County

1	government had Mr. Rizki there, along with Rahul, I
2	forget his last name. Laura Lechowicz from the
3	President's office and we also had Andrea Kluger
4	from the CFL on the phone.
5	The meeting was about 45 minutes. In
6	essence, the discussion was on the County's
7	legislation, and the Fund's funding legislation,
8	that has been discussed for a number of years.
9	We indicated that we provided this
10	funding legislation this year, last year, frankly
11	every year over the last ten years, and that the
12	Board's objective is to secure actuarial funding
13	for us as we are in essence one of the only large
14	pension fund out there without this. "Us" being
15	Cook County and Forest Preserve, of course.
16	The County then discussed the legislation
17	that they had talked about over two years ago,
18	which included the board composition. So there was
19	some discussion by them on that matter and why they
20	felt that was important. We indicated that we are
21	stedfast on funding and that is what our objective
22	is.
23	At the end of the meeting Senator
24	Martwick indicated he was going to talk to CFL

1	representatives and that he might request that we
2	have another meeting.
3	The County indicated that they were going
4	to look at their legislation and possibly come back
5	with a new proposition on board composition.
6	I don't know if any of the other people
7	that were present; Trustee Ochalla, Trustee
8	Kouruklis, or Mary Pat, would like to add anything
9	to that.
10	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: I think that about sums
11	it up.
12	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I have a couple of
13	comments. So, I thought it was nice. I am glad
14	that meeting happened because it allowed us an
15	opportunity to propagate our proposed legislation.
16	It was a little odd because there was no
17	legislation presented prior to that meeting by the
18	President's office so we could not review any
19	details. So we were really working off of a 2019
20	draft that we had multiple letters going back and
21	forth about.
22	So the odd thing about it is that the ARC
23	funding was barely discussed. For the most part,
24	he assumed that we agreed I think on the ARC

1	funding.
2	We stuck to the discussion of the board
3	composition and I think most of the discussion was
4	about adding or changing this board appointments
5	from the President's office and Ammar Rizki said
6	that is a very important part of what their agenda
7	has.
8	I was happy that CFL reached out to us
9	again for this, in what is the third time that we
10	have partnered with them on this issue, and they
11	are for the elective process as far as what they
12	have said to us and I think it is important that we
13	continue that process.
14	Most importantly, I think from sidebar
15	discussion afterwards we conveyed we were so proud
16	of the diversity on this team from having the CFO
17	of the Forest Preserve, having past Forest Preserve
18	Directors, and a couple of lawyers, current and
19	
	past, a purchasing agent, the current comptroller,
20	
20 21	past, a purchasing agent, the current comptroller,

21	past, a purchasing agent, the current comptroller, the current Chief of Staff of the County Treasurer. Sheriff's representatives that have a whole other

1	a nice job presenting that yesterday.
2	Overall, I thought it was a good meeting
3	and I hope that the funding actually gets passed in
4	Springfield so we have something in the future and
5	I think if they are trying to add obviously,
6	they are trying to add appointments to this board,
7	I don't see a need. I think we talked about that
8	before. And if there is, you know, a future
9	discussion on that, well, we haven't seen a
10	proposal. But so far we left the table with the
11	view that we are staying solid with our decision to
12	not change the board makeup, so that is it.
13	PRESIDENT WILSON: Anyone else?
14	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Thank you.
15	PRESIDENT WILSON: I have one comment on
16	this. I don't have facts unfortunately but I heard
17	that my name came up during discussion following
18	Senator Martwick making some comments about how the
19	City's Fund operate and whether or not individuals
20	trustees had conflicts of interest. And I don't
21	know the facts but I do want the record to reflect
22	that I don't have any history of voting present
23	because of a conflict of interest and I have always
24	supported funding for the Pension Fund. The

1	Pension Fund is my primary objective and loyalty in
2	sitting in this seat.
3	During other board compositions,
4	independence was questioned during the meetings and
5	at that time I mentioned and will say again that
6	neither the President nor the CFO's of the County
7	ever include me in strategy meetings or discuss the
8	County strategy in terms of pension matters. They
9	respect the independence that is required by my
10	fiduciary role and that is probably all I want to
11	say on that topic.
12	The funding I will say that I challenged
13	initially was in the past the County Pension Fund
14	at one time had a practice when I first got here
15	sending a bill to Springfield because there was no
16	dialogue between the Board and the County. And I
17	questioned that practice and the feasibility of
18	putting effort in a bill that might have no
19	possibility of passing under the advice of our
20	counsel and consultants versus having a dialogue
21	with the County.
22	Subsequently we have started a dialogue
23	and I certainly agree that if there is no dialogue,
24	if there is no participation or collaboration, that

1 we do have an obligation to seek funding on our 2 own, that is it. 3 Anything else on this? MS. BURNS: Maybe just timing, we may 4 5 need to come back to the Board if something happens 6 between now and May 31st. 7 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: If I may, I think the process we have taken thus far to inform not only 8 9 our board but the County Board and the President 10 and Ammar on what our next steps are going to be 11 have been very good in communicating our message. I think we should continue that. 12 13 We have a long list of letters and updates that we have been providing. We should 14 15 continue that as we move forward. And, hopefully, 16 John McCabe and Derek Blaida will keep us, as they 17 have been, updated on our current legislation and 18 where it is moving. To President Wilson's point, I think he's 19 20 done a phenomenal job as president and I am proud 21 to serve on this board with him. 22 TRUSTEE HUGHES: I would also like to say 23 that I commend President Wilson for his leadership. 24 He's done a good job.

1 And in my role of being CFO of the Forest 2 Preserve when I first began as a trustee here, I 3 think I have been pretty clear that my goals are to 4 change the formula so that we can legally put more 5 money into the fund for the Forest Preserve annuitants. And, of course, it's my responsibility 6 7 to try to find funding to pay for that so that has been an ongoing goal of mine as well. 8 9 PRESIDENT WILSON: Thank you. 10 Anything else on legislative matters? If 11 not, thank you group for the role and keep up the good work. Let's keep pushing. 12 13 Trustee matters. Review and possible 14 action regarding election matters. Gina, can you 15 cover this item, please? 16 MS. TUCZAK: Certainly. You may recall 17 at the March meeting I advised you that our 18 election consultant Tim Walsh had indicated he wouldn't be pursuing a future contract with us. 19 20 Since that time I reached out to my fellow executive directors in the State of 21 22 Illinois, along with some other individuals that 23 have been involved in elections for public pension 24 funds, and I got the names of some other firms that

1	might be able to service the Fund's needs. The
2	names are listed on this memo.
3	They were provided some historical data
4	about our elections, with the exception of the
5	Hensley Company, which has already been involved in
6	our elections and knows the historical information.
7	We gave them some estimates of
8	anticipated responses. We also provided them a
9	form of agreement that was drafted by fiduciary
10	counsel so they can kind of see a possible sample
11	contract and they provided a response.
12	We have in this booklet the five firms
13	listed and some cost projections. If you would
14	like, I can discuss these vendors and the
15	information that we have. I am prepared to do
16	that, if you would like.
17	PRESIDENT WILSON: What is the pleasure
18	of the group?
19	My suggestion, you've got a number of
20	firms here that have submitted proposals, and we do
21	have lead time before the election, rather than
22	doing the analysis and going into the details of
23	the various proposals is this something that we can
24	defer to committee and come back and get some

1	
1	guidance next month to the Legislative Committee?
2	TRUSTEE BLAIR: I would think that would
3	be the best way.
4	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Are you at a point
5	where you feel, Gina, any feeling about who is the
6	person that you would think would serve our need?
7	MS. TUCZAK: I think that if we are going
8	to conduct things as they have been done, which is
9	what I said I was going to do, we have one
10	organization that fits that bill the best. There
11	are some risks with them. They haven't done the
12	full role. They have been involved in the past
13	with Mr. Walsh and that is the Hensley Company.
14	They are located in Chicago. They are really a
15	mail order house. They are the ones in the past
16	that have gone and picked up the ballots and done
17	the barcoding and all that. I can
18	provide more information but to answer Trustee
19	McFadden's question it appears to me that they
20	would be probably the best fit with how we have
21	conducted things in the past.
22	TRUSTEE BLAIR: I think we would have to identify
23	what process we plan to follow before we select one
24	of these vendors to make sure the vendor fits our

1	need. Because I know there was significant
2	discussion 2020 was a unique year. We went from
3	one process into something completely new and maybe
4	that is what we should focus on first to see what
5	process we want to follow as a board and then go
6	into the vendor to see if they can meet our need.
7	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Do we know what
8	process we want to follow as a board or do you want
9	to go down and add two elements at the end?
10	PRESIDENT WILSON: I was suggesting if we
11	don't know, I think we do, but rather than try to
12	have that dialogue in this open group and with such
13	a large group, I thought it could be easier to get
14	a conclusion with your Legislative Committee.
15	My recall was that we had two
16	differences. We had the lack of in-person voting
17	and then we also created a temporary ad hoc group
18	and made a modification and I don't I can't find
19	the August meeting minutes, where it said that it
20	was just a one time versus we were changing the
21	process to go forward. My recall was it was a one
22	time change.
23	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Well, that is my
24	recollection.

1 PRESIDENT WILSON: But I think that this would allow individuals to have more time to go 2 back and review the record and then bring up other 3 suggestions and have a more comprehensive 4 5 conversation, if you do it in committee. TRUSTEE OCHALLA: When is the next 6 7 Legislative Committee meeting? 8 TRUSTEE BLAIR: There isn't one set I 9 don't believe. 10 MS. TUCZAK: We don't have one set. 11 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: If we set it in June to 12 be put on this board's agenda in July, does that 13 give everybody of these companies enough time to 14 evaluate what we want to do and be ready by 15 September to do that? 16 MS. TUCZAK: I think if we met in June, I 17 think it is doable. September on the back end 18 would be too late because petition pickup begins approximately August 20th. So by the August board 19 meeting it should be firm. 20 21 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Right. 22 MS. TUCZAK: But I wanted to make sure I 23 brought you this information early. I know there's 24 been comments about bringing vendor issues when

1	there really is nothing that can be done. There is
2	time but the August meeting really has got to be
3	the very back end of it because of the petition
4	pickup and the notifications that have to go out.
5	TRUSTEE BLAIR: August is too late.
6	Let's set the legislative meeting for June, then we
7	can present those in time for the July meeting. We
8	will be ready to go for August. I would like it to
9	be ready to go when those packets are passed out so
10	that when the packets are passed out everybody
11	knows the rules. Everybody is on the same page.
12	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Do we I'm sorry to
13	interrupt. So do we have a list of issues that we
14	encountered the last time that we could get ahead
15	of time of this meeting so we could fine tune
16	possibly the process? If we are going to use the
17	same process, that is an if, if we are going to use
18	the same process, there may be some tweaks that we
19	may need to do. Or, if you have already made those
20	tweaks, then we don't have to worry about it.
21	MS. TUCZAK: I haven't made any tweaks to
22	the election process.
23	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I think define them,
24	though.

1 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Right. 2 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: There would be the 3 question, that element about sending it out to everyone is a thought with a ballot. The notice 4 5 with the ballot is what we did last year and there was no walk-ins last year. Those are the two big 6 7 ones. 8 And later between the final understanding 9 and shortly after we started having petitions out, there was a wrinkle that was addressed that was 10 11 pretty simple. Someone -- it seemed like it was a 12 big deal at that time. Do you remember what that 13 was? MS. TUCZAK: I do. It was a request to 14 15 get petitions electronically. 16 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Yes. 17 TRUSTEE BLAIR: To send them 18 electronically? MS. TUCZAK: No, to receive them 19 20 electronically versus getting a person to get the 21 document. MS. BURNS: You had to find an Election 22 23 Administrator, you had to go through that last 24 time.

1 TRUSTEE BLAIR: We put a really I think a 2 sound process in place to address that. 3 MS. BURNS: To Trustee McFadden's point, there were some suggestions by Trustee Kouruklis 4 5 that there should be a drop off box maybe in the lobby. 6 7 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I had six employees. None of them were from the Treasurer's but they had 8 9 called me and said where do I go? They were from 10 different parts of the County because they were 11 managers that were here during the pandemic 12 working. 13 MS. BURNS: I think we can prepare that 14 list of all those things that you brought up 15 because Gina has kept a running tab in talking 16 about them for the last couple of months. We can 17 put that together for you so you have that to help 18 the committee focus. TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: One thing I'd like to 19 20 add, and I know this is not a meeting about what we 21 should bring up, but an email, multiple emails, 22 that go out reminding people to vote. I find 23 myself going around telling people over and over to 24 make sure they go vote.

1 MS. TUCZAK: If I can address that, that 2 is a tricky issue because the County would have to 3 send those emails. And I think President Wilson and I -- I don't want to catch you off guard -- we 4 talked a little bit about this. The process for 5 the County to send out mass emails is something 6 7 that will be a challenge to get approval on that. 8 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So that is a good 9 point. I will hope coordinate that, if you'd like, 10 to just make sure that the HR Directors over each 11 department for the County can send out their own 12 reminder. 13 I am part of the Chiefs of Staff meeting 14 that we have once a month, I will bring that up. 15 If we have a message already drafted, I can 16 actually send it to all of them and have them 17 disburse it. Regardless of their HRs, I will talk 18 to their Chiefs of Staff since we have our monthly 19 meeting. 20 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: It used to be that the 21 department heads would be advised of an election 22 and then they were obligated to make sure everyone 23 was aware. 24 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I think it happens

1 but because now a lot of people are still working 2 from home, you don't interact with people as much. 3 TRUSTEE BLAIR: They don't see the bulletin boards as often. 4 5 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Right. TRUSTEE OCHALLA: There are some 6 7 contracts for union folks the bulletin boards are now replaced with electronic notification. 8 9 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: The earlier we get 10 that message, the better, you know, I can keep 11 reminding them. 12 MS. TUCZAK: There will be a newsletter 13 sent to the actives and the annuitants shortly 14 after the Financials are finished, so probably in 15 June, there will be a Notice of Election, 16 indicating that there will be an election and some 17 information. 18 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I'm sorry, you want to be specific then so you at the front end pick a 19 20 date that they are available for pickup, if nothing 21 else. 22 MS. TUCZAK: Okay. 23 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I would think. 24 MS. TUCZAK: Excellent point. It needs

1	to be specific. And then that would be a written
2	communication to the actives and to the annuitants,
3	but I recognize that on the active side email may
4	be a more viewed communication.
5	TRUSTEE BLAIR: So is Legislative where
6	we want to have this conversation?
7	PRESIDENT WILSON: Yes.
8	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Okay, let's do that.
9	PRESIDENT WILSON: Relative to that, let
10	me know approximately when you would like to send
11	that email to all staff and how many. If we're
12	going to send it once, a reminder, I have a meeting
13	also with Chief Information Officer tomorrow.
14	MS. TUCZAK: Okay. It sounds like we
15	have to wait I think the June meeting to talk
16	about, probably not ready yet.
17	PRESIDENT WILSON: Just a reminder to
18	tell people to vote, that is what I am referring
19	to.
20	MS. TUCZAK: That is later, okay. The
21	first announcement is the Notice of Election
22	indicating when it is and then after that it is,
23	assuming that there is more than one candidate, the
24	notice to vote. Thank you.

1 PRESIDENT WILSON: Next step, are we 2 going to try to schedule some dates, get a consensus now, or do that offline? 3 TRUSTEE BLAIR: We can do it offline. 4 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: I make a motion this 5 be referred to the Legislative Committee. 6 7 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Second. 8 PRESIDENT WILSON: It has been moved by Trustee McFadden and seconded by Trustee Blair to 9 refer the review of the election vendor 10 11 considerations and the election options to the 12 Legislative Committee. 13 Roll call, please. 14 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Come back to us when? 15 TRUSTEE BLAIR: July. 16 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair. TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye. 17 18 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes. TRUSTEE HUGHES: 19 Aye. 20 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis. 21 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden. 22 23 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye. 24 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius.

1 TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye. 2 MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla. 3 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee O'Rourke. 4 5 TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Aye. MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson. 6 7 PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye. Thank you. The next matter is investment 8 9 Gina, please proceed. matters. 10 MS. TUCZAK: Certainly. We have an 11 Investment Committee meeting and an emerging 12 manager investment subcommittee in May. 13 There is a healthy agenda of topics to 14 discuss. But one of the items on there is a real 15 estate equity debt emerging manager request for 16 proposal that we are going to be requesting 17 approval on. 18 What we did just to try provide with you as much as information as we can in advance for 19 20 adequate review time, we do have a draft of it here for you to take a look at. 21 22 There is no action needed. It is just a 23 preemptive measure to allow you time to take a look 24 at it.

1 In addition, based on some of the great 2 insight from Trustee McFadden, we are going to be 3 including a side letter to verify the draft to assist with contract matters once the committee has 4 and the board has made a decision on the finalists. 5 6 Again, this is just for information so 7 that you have it with some adequate time for reading it. 8 9 PRESIDENT WILSON: Any questions, comments, on this matter? 10 11 Thank you, Gina. Let's move on to health benefit matters 12 13 and review and consideration of CVS non-Medicare 14 contract. Would you present that item, please, 15 Gina? 16 MS. TUCZAK: Yes, thank you. 17 Back in 2018, the Fund staff participated 18 in a City of Chicago agency coalition for a pharmacy benefit manager selection. This predates 19 20 my time, but the decision was made in 2018 to go with CVS, which was the vendor at the time so it 21 22 was a continuation. 23 A contract has been reviewed and 24 finalized. The contract period is January 1, 2019

1 through December 31, 2021. 2 I have confirmation from Segal that the 3 RFP that was presented, the term and underwriting conditions, are in the contract. And Burke, Burns 4 5 and Pinelli, fiduciary counsel, has signed off as 6 to the form of agreement being in compliance with 7 Illinois law. So what I am seeking here is authority as 8 9 the Executive Director to go ahead and execute the 10 contract. 11 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Move approval. 12 TRUSTEE BLAIR: Second. 13 PRESIDENT WILSON: It has been moved by 14 Trustee McFadden and seconded by Trustee Blair. Is 15 there any discussion or questions on the motion? TRUSTEE HUGHES: I have one question. 16 17 This expires at the end of 2021 so are there 18 extension options with this? I was going to talk to the 19 MS. TUCZAK: chair of the Health Benefits Committee, but what I 20 would request is that I work with our consultant to 21 22 discuss a possible renewal, an amendment to the 23 agreement for a period of time. 24 TRUSTEE HUGHES: Thank you.

1	MS. TUCZAK: But that will be the
2	discussion. I thought first get the contract done.
3	TRUSTEE HUGHES: It makes sense.
4	PRESIDENT WILSON: Is there any other
5	discussion or questions on the motion?
6	Peggy, please call the roll.
7	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Blair.
8	TRUSTEE BLAIR: Aye.
9	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Hughes.
10	TRUSTEE HUGHES: Aye.
11	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Kouruklis.
12	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Aye.
13	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee McFadden.
14	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Aye.
15	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Nevius.
16	TRUSTEE NEVIUS: Aye.
17	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Ochalla.
18	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Aye.
19	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee O'Rourke.
20	TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Aye.
21	MS. FAHRENBACH: Trustee Wilson.
22	PRESIDENT WILSON: Aye.
23	That motion passes, thank you.
24	Administrative matters. Gina, can you

1	tell us about the signature verification project,
2	please?
3	MS. TUCZAK: Certainly. You may recall
4	at the last meeting, there was discussion and
5	interest from the Trustees with respect to the
6	signature affidavit process of the Fund. I told
7	you I would look into it and get back to you.
8	By way of background, on a weekly basis,
9	we do have a match of our annuitants' Social
10	Security numbers with the Illinois Vital Records
11	and we also use a private service search engine
12	called PBI Research Services. Once we get those
13	matches every Monday, we do take action on those.
14	But putting that aside, the last time
15	that we did a written verification project on
16	annuitants, we had two pieces to that. In 2019, we
17	did that on out of state annuitants. Prior to that
18	beginning in 2014 through about 2016, we actually
19	sent out requests to all annuitants that were 80
20	years of age and older.
21	So, it's been a little while since we
22	have done a canvas of all annuitants. So I worked
23	with the Finance Director and our Member Outreach
24	Coordinator and we put together a project plan to

1	do a mailing to all annuitants in a staged process,
2	that we would request their signature and a notary
3	on an affidavit that would in essence verify that
4	they continue to be eligible for benefits.
5	We would start this process with those
6	annuitants that are 80 years of age and older and
7	that would begin in the first week of June. We
8	would send that mailing out by the first Friday in
9	June.
10	And there is about 4900 annuitants in
11	this group and I might add that group would include
12	all the Forest Preserve annuitants. It is a small
13	group so we would just put them in that first pile.
14	And then we have a schedule of when we
15	would send out a second request and a third request
16	for those nonresponders.
17	The procedure that I have proposed here
18	is that again there would be a notary required.
19	Currently there is a Governor's proclamation that
20	does allow digital notarization. If that is
21	extended, we would allow that for purposes of this
22	process and include information in the mailing
23	about that.
24	We would also include a business reply

1	envelope so to facilitate receiving these responses
2	and hopefully providing a little bit less of a need
3	having to do second and third requests much.
4	The second group would be those
5	annuitants ages 79 to 70 and that process would be
6	begin in the middle of July, that would be the
7	second group and that group has approximately 7800
8	annuitants in there. And we again have a process
9	for a second request and a third request.
10	The goal would be that by January of 2022
11	we would come back to you with those names that
12	have been nonresponsive and consider suspension of
13	benefits.
14	Then at that time we would do the last
15	group, which is those that are 69 years of age and
16	younger, and that is about another 7900 annuitants.
17	We did not budget for this project in
18	2021. The budget for 2021 would be about \$20,000.
19	It is mostly the postage out and the postage in and
20	then some printing costs for envelopes and whatnot.
21	But the expectation is that staff could manage this
22	project as long as we do it in staged groups.
23	TRUSTEE OCHALLA: Is this something that
24	you are considering say on like a biannual basis

1	because I see your time frame runs from June 4th of
2	this year with all of the lists out in July of
3	2022. And then would you then anticipate June of
4	2023 starting the process over again to keep the
5	records up-to-date as possible or is this a one
6	time thing until you think it is necessary again?
7	MS. TUCZAK: I think, assuming it goes
8	according to plan, this would be something that
9	would be considered on a rotational basis.
10	TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Gina, is this
11	something we have done over the years as a matter
12	of routine?
13	MS. TUCZAK: The last time we did this

1	all annuitants in a very long time but I do think
2	that it warrants something to be done.
3	TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Is the overall purpose
4	of this is to add another weapon to fight fraud?
5	MS. TUCZAK: Yes. That is the irony is
6	even if you catch one person, it pays for itself,
7	that is the purpose.
8	MS. BURNS: It is a requirement of the
9	Pension Code. The Pension Code was amended,
10	Section 1-140, provides that you have to have a
11	process of verifying which annuitants are living
12	and which are dead and this, what Gina articulated,
13	is your process. So the legislature has determined
14	it is prudent for pension funds to conduct this
15	process. You follow the law.
16	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I think we have a
17	process, though.
18	MS. BURNS: We do.
19	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: So this is just an
20	additional process.
21	MS. BURNS: This is the process.
22	TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: No, I think we have
23	other things that we do.
24	MS. BURNS: We go to outside sources.

1 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: Right. Gina, am I 2 correct? 3 MS. TUCZAK: That is correct, we have two data matches. 4 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: This is an added 5 insurance kind of for the Fund to see if that 6 7 process, the one we currently have, is working or 8 could we even do a better job? 9 MS. TUCZAK: Yes. I think one of the risks with the data matches is that sometimes 10 11 Social Security number deaths are not reported so this would be a canvas to catch that. 12 13 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: But according to Mary 14 Pat, it is in accordance with the law that we have 15 to do. 16 MS. BURNS: I will report to you that 17 almost every other public pension fund has a 18 similar process. How often they do it is where the process differs. 19 20 TRUSTEE HUGHES: It is an annual cost? 21 MS. BURNS: Yes. 22 TRUSTEE HUGHES: I assume, I don't know 23 for sure, but I know I get letters annually and I send them back. 24

1 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: What again is the 2 statute of limitations on us recovering funds from 3 a fraud act, do you remember, is it three years from when we find out? 4 5 MS. BURNS: If it is a mistake, we can go 6 back three years to recover. I might assert we 7 wouldn't be able to go all the way back beyond three years, but I would never concede that three 8 9 years is the limit because it is really not our 10 mistake. It would have been their failure to tell 11 us the person had died so that is the only reason 12 why I am hesitating to answer. 13 TRUSTEE OCHALLA: The reason I ask the 14 question is if we are going to set this up on a 15 rotational basis make sure that we do it in such a 16 way that we are not doing out too far out to catch 17 that, if we do catch someone, that we want to 18 recover funds from. Again, Trustee O'Rourke, we 19 MS. BURNS: suspend the payments, we don't terminate them. 20 The 21 minute the annuitant reaches out to Gina she 22 releases the payments. But she will come to you 23 before that happens and historically staff gives 24 the board a list of who they are going to suspend

1 payments for, so in case any trustee knows anybody 2 or recognize any names, that gives us an additional 3 level of contacting these people. TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Mary Pat, you said 4 5 that the law requires us to have a process. Does it require us to have this process or a process? 6 7 MS. BURNS: No, sir, it requires you to 8 set a process. 9 TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: So if we already have 10 a process and this is a second or supplemental 11 process, then I do question why we are doing it at 12 all. 13 To me, if we start this, we will create a situation where -- I don't know if I am 14 15 exaggerating but we are going to scare a lot of 16 older people. Running around looking how to get 17 notarized. They are going to get nervous and 18 stuff. Then people who don't reply will then be subjected to some type of consequence, some 19 20 negative consequence. 21 So, in my way of thinking about the 22 world, I don't like to setup a negative consequence 23 for people I am in business with, unless it is a 24 good reason to do it. I mean, I don't know. Are

1	we hearing about a lot of fraud that we really need
2	to combat?
3	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: The notary public
4	signature is a pain. But you broach can we
5	quantify how much we are missing or
6	MS. BURNS: You don't know.
7	MR. LEDONNE: I think this process will
8	give us insight into what we are missing. If we
9	find zero going through this process, that is great
10	news and maybe it means we don't need to go through
11	this process. I'd be surprised if we find zero but
12	maybe it will only be one or two.
13	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Tell me, all the
14	annuitants get the newsletter, if that is a
15	question. How many of them came back in the mail
16	last time and is someone tasked with determining
17	why?
18	MS. TUCZAK: The newsletter I don't
19	recall the return to sender process on that. The
20	most recent mailing we would have that would have
21	been a return to sender would be the 1099s and the
22	beginning of the year advices that everybody gets
23	when they get their cost of living increases.
24	TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Okay, great, that is

1 better. 2 MS. TUCZAK: We do have guite a few that 3 come back and Linda manages that process of communication with people that call and say I 4 5 didn't get this or that. There still is a quantity of those that are unresolved. 6 7 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Now that you mentioned 8 Linda -- Linda --9 MS. TUCZAK: Thorsen. 10 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: Concerns herself with 11 getting the 1099s in the mail and the ones that 12 come back. If I remember right, a couple of years 13 ago walking past her office, I saw a pile like this 14 of those 1099 envelopes. 15 If we are not focusing on return mail, 16 then I am inclined to agree. I don't think we have 17 done the basic elements, that is just a thought. 18 There is a world of information when you get mail back. And if I remember right, there is quite --19 20 well, maybe not relative but there is quite a bit 21 of mail that comes back. 22 TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Did we ever try a 23 situation where we put out a letter to everybody 24 saying it is your responsibility as an annuitant to

1 be honest and to rely with a reasonable request of 2 information. If you are not honest, then you are 3 in violation of whatever and so it is on you to let us know. 4 5 I mean, rather than ask them on an individual basis, A, have you ever been by the 6 7 book, if we just -- it avoids to me kind of putting ourselves in a situation where we are grinding 8 9 teeth with recipients, who hopefully are like 99 10 percent honest, good people, and do we need to do 11 that. A lot of them take responsibility on themselves. Or, we can place responsibility on the 12 other side and say it is your duty to comply with 13 whatever exact ways you want to comply with. 14 15 I am not looking to kill time in this 16 meeting but I am wondering if we really need to go 17 down this road. 18 MS. BURNS: If I may, just as your lawyer, I am going to highly recommend you follow 19 20 this process. It is the process that has been determined by other public pension funds to be 21 22 prudent. 23 To tell you the truth, your statement of 24 about letting people know they have to be honest,

1 yes, we can do that in a newsletter. But these 2 people effected, our members, are dead when this 3 fraud occurs. In other words, it is the kid, the son and the daughter, who continues to cash the 4 5 payments without any notice to us. 6 So as a public pension fund, there have 7 been numerous times where this fund and other funds have continued to pay out taxpayer funded benefits 8 9 to people who are deceased and not entitled to 10 receive those benefits. 11 This is a way of trying to catch those situations and it is deemed to be prudent and on 12 top of that, getting responses from our annuitants, 13 gives us a chance to update our records. Because 14 15 we say to people, if you moved to a nursing home, 16 now we have your new address. Through the process, 17 we find these people which allows us to then better 18 communicate with our members; and better deal with their powers of attorney to be able to help them at 19 the end of their lives. 20 21 It is really an information gathering 22 process as well. So I understand that you never 23 want to hurt your members and we don't do that with 24 this process. What we do is we get this paperwork

1	in and if we don't get it in we suspend the
2	payment. And usually one or two months after not
3	getting their payment, they surface, which allows
4	us then to update our information, get them the
5	money and move forward.
6	Through this process for many people we
7	learn that they need us to transfer the payments to
8	the nursing home where our member lives so that the
9	nursing home can then use the money to take care of
10	the particular member because they don't have
11	family to do it.
12	This is a healthy process. We shouldn't
13	look at this as a negative. Yes, it costs a little
14	money and lots of time from the staff, but it is a
15	service to our members because we really don't hurt
16	them. We don't take their payments away. You, as
17	a board, simply suspend it until they surface so
18	that we can update records.
19	I get what you are saying but I would
20	highly encourage you as a fiduciary to think about
21	having some practice in place, even if this process
22	is modified. How often you do it, that is open. I
23	think Trustee Ochalla's point is well taken. You
24	might time it so you're not doing the outreach

1 every year like the City funds but that is up to 2 you. 3 TRUSTEE O'ROURKE: Is it feasible to do 4 it by alphabetically? We do 20 percent one year 5 and 20 percent another year. MS. BURNS: 6 Sure. 7 TRUSTEE BLAIR: I think it's up to us. 8 We can decide that part. 9 MS. BURNS: You just want a process. 10 MS. TUCZAK: We certainly could. I think 11 we thought that the higher risk was starting with 12 the older population and moving that way down the 13 list. 14 TRUSTEE MCFADDEN: The results of this 15 will help us a lot. 16 MS. TUCZAK: I have done this before and it was very interesting what came back. 17 18 TRUSTEE KOURUKLIS: I don't know if this calls for a motion but I will motion for this. 19 Ι 20 also think we should do the return mail regardless. 21 We should have it teamed together, even if it is 22 one or two tests, only to do return mail and then 23 once that is solved then you can continue it on a 24 regular basis but that definitely should happen
